LAKEVIEW LACONICS

George H. Ayres of Fort Bidwell,
 formerly editor of the Lakeview Her-

 visit to old friends. He is a real es-
 tate operator, and is forming a new
 town in Surprise Valley, Modoc coun-
 ty, California.

G. B. Graves has completed the
 brick work and plastering for the
 new Catholic church. A couple of
 years ago there was not even a con-
