 Make Way for the New Heryford
 Block.

 LAKEVIEW, Nov. 20.—One of the
 old landmarks of Lakeview is giving
 way to the march of progress that is
 making Lakeview one of the best
 towns of its size in Oregon.

The building that has been used
 for many years as a livery and feed
 barn, on the corner near the court
 house, and directly across the street
 from the new Odd Fellows' Temple, is
 being razed to make way for the
 Heryford block.

The latter will be three stories
 high, of brick, and modern in every
 respect. It is expected to be used
 for stores and floors for offices, al-
 though there is a belief that it may
 be the long-looked for hotel that has
 been promised the town. This is
 one of the most valuable corners in
 Lakeview.
