RECLAIMING LOGGED-OFF LAND

A VALUABLE bulletin, entitled "The Utilization of logged-off Land for Pasture in Western Oregon and Western Washington" has been issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, being written by Byron Hunter, agriculturalist, office of farm management, and Harry Thompson, expert, office of farm management.

Beginning, the essay calls attention to the great timber tracts of the two states, and the fact that cutting of the forests leaves "logged-off" or "cut over" land which is very expensive to bring under cultivation, in most instances the cost of the raw stump land plus the cost of clearing exceeding the value of land after it is under cultivation. For this reason the bulk of the logged-off land has been permitted to lie unimproved and unused since the timber was removed.

During the summer months, the writers say, when the logs, tree tops and rubbish on the surface of the ground becomes thoroughly dry, uncontrollable fires not infrequently sweep over these waste acres. In this way the logged-off land may become a menace to standing timber and to homes of property of the settlers who are making farms of these lands.

The authors of the paper see the need of help for the farmer to clear off these lands economically, not only to get rid of the danger from fires, but to get the benefit of the land which ought to be put to some useful end instead of lying idle, and whose area to the amount of logging done each year, is increasing much faster than it is being put to farm purposes.

At this time there are approximately 3,000,000 acres of unimproved logged-off land in Western Oregon and Western Washington. Rapid increase in population of the two states has created a great demand for farm produce, which has made, in turn, a great market for farm land and has brought before the people prominently the question of utilizing logged-off land.

The writers go into detail as to the preparation of logged-off land for pasture, time to burn, preparation for the burning, the best things to plant on the regenerated areas and the kind of stock to pasture. This pamphlet should prove very valuable to many owners of land in the Klamath Basin and vicinity, and will be sent on request made to the department of agriculture, Washington, for Farmers' Bulletin No. 462, which is the official title of the publication.

German army officers thought her flirtations with them were for the purpose of drawing from them secrets of the mobilization of the German army, and she was sentenced to serve eight months in prison.

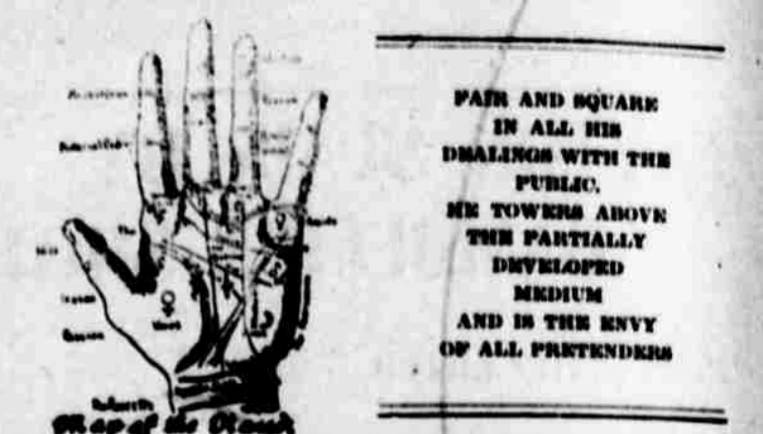
