REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS

CONDITIONS appear to be quite
 favorable for either Klamath or
 Lake county securing the next con-
 gressman for this district, which is
 now composed of the sixteen coun-
 ties east of the Cascades. No candi-
 dates have yet appeared in the north-
 ern end of the district, where the bulk
 of the population is, and the report
 is to the effect that Umatilla and per-
 haps Baker counties will each have a
 candidate for United States senator
 to succeed Jonathan Bourne. That
 being the case, it is not probable that
 they will jeopardize their success by
 putting up much of a fight for a con-
 gressman.

W. Lair Thompson of Lakeview,
 who has been spoken of as a possible
 candidate for congress, has announced
 that he will not enter the race, and
 it is presumed that he will make an
 effort to secure election to the state
 senate to succeed Senator Merryman
 of this city. This would leave nothing
 for Klamath county unless we were
 given the congressman.

For the past year the interests of
 this county have been sadly neglected,
 as Congressman Hawley has had to
 devote his attention to the needs of
 the people from whom he would have
 to look for support at the coming elec-
 tion. With so much depending on
 the progress of government irrigation,
 the prospective opening of the Indian
 reservation, the necessity for a gov-
 ernment building and other important
 matters of this section needing atten-
 tion, Klamath county should have a
 representative in congress.

The time is not far off when the
 people of Klamath county will have
 to consider this matter and get into
 the game if we are to be represented
 at Washington. One of the first
 things is to determine on the man,
 and then let every voter back up the
 choice. The people of Oregon will
 not accept any of the old line party
 men. They want a progressive, one
 who is in sympathy with their needs
 and who will work for their interests
 without dictation from the bosses.

UNITED INDIAN TRIBES

RICHARD C. ADAMS, a Delawar
 Indian lawyer, has started a
 movement to organize all members of
 the Red race in the United States in
 one brotherhood. He is being assisted
 by Attorney H. H. Phipps of Spo-
 kane. The purpose of the brotherhood
 is to unite all of the tribes in one
 body to work in unison, to protect the
 rights of the red man and to secure
 recognition of the claims which vari-
 ous tribes have against the govern-
 ment.

It is undoubtedly true that the
 original inhabitants of this country
 have rights which they are being de-
 prived of through the inability to se-
 cure attention from the proper offi-
 cials of the government, and the In-
 dians are showing the result of their
 modern education by their determina-
 tion to unite their forces in an effort
 to secure recognition of their rights.
 The white man has shown his red
 brother what can be accomplished by
 united effort and combinations of
 capital and labor, so why should not
 the Indian organize?
