MARKET PLACES

A MEANS toward bringing pro-
 ducer and consumer together,
 cutting out the middlemen, a number
 of cities throughout the country are
 trying the experiment of a centrally
 located market house, to which the
 farmers bring their fresh produce and
 to which the city buyers come to buy
 direct from the men who grow the
 foodstuffs. Market houses are by no
 means new, but in the great majority
 of cases heretofore they have simply
 dispensed with the retailer and al-
 lowed the ultimate consumer to buy
 direct from the wholesaler or the com-
 mission man, with profits added to
 what the original producers received.
 The present plan is to allow farmers
 the use of public streets, or even to
 erect a permanent market house
 structure and rent stalls therein for a
 nominal sum and permit the farmers,
 during certain hours or on specified
 days, to sell direct to the consumer.

Mr. Don E. Mowry sends the fol-
 lowing interesting account of the way
 in which Madison, Wis., has solved
 the problem:

"Madison, Wis., is one of the few
 smaller cities of the country that have
 realized the importance of bringing
 the farmers and the city dweller closer
 together. Madison has done this
 by the building of a city market place
 at the expense of \$54,000.

"Mayor J. C. Schubert believes that
 there should exist a spirit of communi-
 ty of interests between the farmers
 and the city people, and with this as
 his chief argument he kept constantly
 at it until his common council appro-
 priated the necessary funds with
 which to build the market and give
 the city a market center.

"When the building was complet-
 ed last November over 4,000 circulars
 were sent out to the farmers of Dane
 county, in which Madison is centrally
 located, telling them of the market,
 and urging them to come to Madison
 to get acquainted with the facilities
 offered them. Nothing was said on
 the opening day—it was simply a
 'get-acquainted' grand opening of
 what is proving to be one of the
 best things that a city administration
 could do.

"Farmers from all sections of the
 country are bringing their vegetables,
 produce, garden truck and meats to
 the market, where at a very moder-
 ate cost they secure a stall for their
 use for the day. The link between
 the producer or grower and the con-
 sumer has been made. The market
 is that link. It is proving of imme-
 diate value to both the grower and
 the consumer. The farmer is now
 able to put his produce on his wagon,
 go to market, secure his stand for the
 day, and be assured that enough peo-
 ple will call at the market to pur-
 chase all that he has to offer. The
 consumer knows that he can go to the
 market and secure fresh produce and
 at a saving over the price charged in
 the stores throughout the city.

"Many of our larger cities have es-
 tablished markets and market cen-
 ters, as, for example, Boston, Charle-
 stown, New York, Washington, D. C.,
 Baltimore, New Orleans and others,
 but the activity has not been com-
 mensurate with the local needs.
 Nothing has been done to bring the
 farmers in direct communication with
 the markets. In many instances the

markets are rented out and the cities
 receive an annual rental. This plan
 has proven of some benefit to the city
 dwellers, but of comparatively little
 value to the farming communities.

"If market centers are to be es-
 tablished in our cities they must be
 established along the lines instituted
 in Madison, where the chief aim is to
 secure a direct communication with
 the farmer who has produce to offer
 for sale. The city's people will avail
 themselves of the opportunities of-
 fered, but the city administration
 must work hand in hand with the
 farmers. The farmers must be given
 assurances; then the city people must
 be told of the advantages offered. The
 administration must be the middle-
 man working for the market outlet
 for the farmers and for the marked
 savings for the city's people.

"Madison city officials realize that
 the interests of the city are not dis-
 tinct and separate from the interests
 of the country around about it. That
 is why the market was established.
 That is why over 4,000 people living
 in Dane county were asked to take
 advantage of the market opening.
 That is why the market is going to be
 a part of Dane county's progress. This
 is truly another evidence of co-opera-
 tion—and co-operation spells suc-
 cess."—Farmer Stockman.

FAIR PLAY FOR ALL.

THE city council of Klamath Falls
 is made up of good citizens, who
 have the welfare of the city at heart,
 and who wish to do fairly by all the
 people of the city. At times, how-
 ever, they seem so liberal that when
 their openhandedness sudden vases
 those who have depended on getting
 privileges at the hands of the city
 fathers feel that it is an injustice, and
 are consequently aggrieved at the
 treatment accorded them.

As an abstract proposition some-
 will argue that if a favor is granted
 to one man it should be granted to
 all others, whether it was strictly
 right to grant the favor in the first
 place, or whether it was wrong.

Another proposition which is made
 alongside of this is that when a favor
 is granted which is "stretching it a
 little," that the first man to whom
 such a favor is refused should not
 complain because he is refused, as
 he is getting strict justice.

You can take your choice of the two
 propositions, as to which the Herald
 is inclined to side with the latter, but
 nobody can deny that if strict justice
 were meted out in the first place there
 would be less confusion and less cause
 for repining in some quarters.

This discussion is brought up by
 the muddle in which the council finds
 itself by the condition of the building
 permits.

Laxity toward violators of various
 city regulations has led the council
 into something of a blind alley in re-
 gard to these, and as a result last
 night two permits were withheld be-
 cause the people had gone ahead and
 built without a permit, and a third
 permit was withheld, although the
 petitioner had already torn away part
 of a building in preparation.

Whether others have in the past
 done their building without getting
 permits, depending on the council to
 exercise its prerogative of grace, the
 Herald is not prepared to say.

But other things have been done
 which would easily lead those not
 strict in their scruples to walk in the
 forbidden paths, or at least in paths
 which ought to be forbidden.

For instance, some weeks ago the
 council issued to a property owner a
 permit to build of certain materials,
 and that property owner proceeded
 to build with a more flimsy character
 of substances than he had agreed to
 do in asking the permit.

While he probably should have,
 strictly speaking, been made to con-
 form to his building permit, or his
 building torn down, nothing was
 done. There was no investigation of
 his violation of his contract with the
 city, no attention paid to the matter
 other than to discuss the fact and
 realize that the council had been
 "thrown." At least, the council might
 have censured this person, which
 would have been shown to a certain
 extent that it intended that the rights
 it had were to be respected.

What one may do others expect to
 be allowed to do, and nothing is more
 natural than when a building permit
 is granted and violated in this fash-
 ion that others, who wish to put up
 buildings, and who, however, expect
 to use the materials they specify in
 their application, should go ahead and
 start building, expecting that the mat-
 ter will carry through.

It's not right on their part.
 But it's human nature.
 Let's have it a little different.

In order to have it different the
 council should lay out a line of action
 and how to it.

This will entitle the council to the
 respect of the citizens as regards its
 orders, and will also result in not
 making, as Councilman White aptly
 put it, "fish of one and flesh of an-
 other."
