ALFALFA SEED PAYS WELL

ONE OF THE profitable industries
 which up to the present time has
 not received the attention of the
 Klamath farmers that its importance
 warrants is the growing of alfalfa
 seed for market. With the large acre-
 age in alfalfa and the unsurpassed
 soil for its growth in this county, it
 is surprising that the farmers have
 not given more attention to the rais-
 ing of seed. However, a number of
 them are already experimenting on a
 considerable scale, and it is safe to
 say that within the next few years
 the industry will expand to large pro-
 portions.

In Union county, which is also well
 adapted to the growing of the seed
 the industry is already well advanced,
 although this is practically the first
 year any attention has been given to
 it. A report stated that from one acre
 W. J. Townley threshed 714 pounds,
 which sold for 15 cents per pound.

Among those who have raised alfalfa
 seed this year are: D. S. Kent,
 14,318 pounds; W. J. Townley, 10,717
 pounds; F. A. Ames, 2,317 pounds;
 B. F. Wilson, 4,000 pounds. The seed
 is all sacked in white seamless sacks
 running 160 to 170 pounds per sack.
 When \$1,000 to \$1,250 worth can be
 loaded on a wagon and hauled to mar-
 ket some idea of the value of this in-
 dustry can be gained.

CHRISTIAN TURK SOLDIERS
 DESERTING SULTAN'S ARMY

Loss of Forces From Royal Banks of
 Fighting Men Leads Military Lead-
 ers to Threaten to Resort to Con-
 dition of "Siege."

ADRIANOPLE, European Turkey,
 Nov. 25.—Scores of Turkish soldiers
 who are of the Christian faith are de-
 serting from the Turkish forces in
 this district.

A condition of "siege" is threatened
 by the military authorities if deser-
 tions continue.

High School Boys Impressed by Mil-
 itary Authorities, in Violation, It is
 Alleged, of Law Exempting Such
 Youths From Service

SALONIKA, Nov. 25.—In bringing
 every available man to the colors, the
 Turkish military authorities have im-
 pressed into service students and
 scholars in the higher schools.

The charge is made that the Turks
 are violating the law which specifi-
 cally provides that students shall not be
 compelled to do military service.

The Turks, however, contend that
 the law applies only to Mohammedan
 schools, and not to Christian gym-
 nasiums.
