

STOOD HIGH AMONG FELLOW STUDENTS

Leon Ray, president of the student body; Mr. Geary, who is manager of athletics at the university; Ben Chandler, one of Virgil's room mates in the Sigma Nu fraternity house where the young man met his death, and William Lowell, a prominent senior.

Ordinary university procedure was abandoned yesterday out of respect to the deceased, and memorial exercises were held in Villard hall, Eugene. The hall was filled to overflowing with students and Eugene people.

Mr. Geary states that the memorial decorations were beautiful and impressive, the students having gone into the woods and gathered great quantities of greenery, which were placed about the rostrum.

In the evening the body lay for view by the students, with members of the junior class acting as ushers. At midnight the freshman class, numbering about 150 young men, with bared heads, marched with the remains to the Southern Pacific depot.

Half a dozen physicians who visited and examined the body of Noland after the tragic death agreed that his death was a peaceful one, and attended with no suffering, Mr. Geary says. The expression of the features was calm and peaceful, as though the student-athlete were asleep.

Mr. Chandler and Sidney Henderson, the former a fellow member of the football team with Virgil, had living quarters with him in a suite of

two rooms in the Sigma Nu chapter house. Mr. Chandler entered the rooms about 2:30 p. m. Wednesday, where Virgil lay in the electric bathrobe, and chatted with him for a moment. About 4:30 o'clock Mr. Henderson, returning from classes, stepped into the room where Virgil was, but did not notice that he was lying on the bed.

The funeral services of the young man will be held tomorrow at 3 p. m. from the parents' residence, 18 Pine street, with Rev. Dr. Henry C. Collins, rector of Grace Episcopal congregation, officiating.

Resolutions adopted yesterday by the members of the bar, of sympathy with Judge George Noland for the affliction which has befallen his family, were signed by every member, and are as follows:

"We have met to give expression of our profound sympathy felt for a friend, co-worker and honored member of our Bar, whose loss of an only son, in the prime of youth, leaves inconsolable a father and mother, who cherished expectations of a brilliant career for their only son, now taken from us by untoward accident in the pride of physical excellence, mental development and moral stamina.

"The Bar of Klamath county, Oregon, extends its deepest sympathy to the bereaved parents in their great bereavement and irremediable loss one of whom we confidently expected some day to add luster to an honorable profession, nor as citizens can we over-estimate the loss to the community of a bright, conscientious and fearless intellect so suddenly blotted out.

"During his career at the University of Oregon, he achieved a reputation as a careful, hard-working, conscientious student, and at once took an enviable part in the college exercises of the present school year. As

a student he was loved by professor and fellow student alike, and in his college life soon won a first place for his diligence and persevering work. He was studious and ambitious, and had he been spared to have entered the profession of his choice, would have won high honors at the Bar.

"In his death the state has lost a splendid young citizen, his family a lovable, manly son, and his friends a loyal, noble companion.

"Your committee, therefore, begs leave to suggest that the foregoing memorial be spread upon the records of the court, and that a copy thereof, under the seal of the court, be forwarded to his family, and that an adjournment of the court be had until Monday, November 27th, 1911, as a testimony of the sympathy of the court and bar to the honorable George Noland late presiding judge of this court, and now an esteemed member of this bar, in the misfortune which overwhelms his family."
