ON THE WAY TO EMPIRE

DESTINY is working out in the
 Willamette Valley. The Harri-
 man system is forced to electrify its
 line in the Willamette region. If it
 does not, it will lose the business.

The interurban electric road is a
 population maker. It is quick and
 convenient locomotion. It affords a
 more frequent service. It eliminates
 the nauseating locomotive smoke.

The history of the Oregon Electric
 between Salem and Portland is the
 proof. It has trains that have re-
 duced the time to an hour and a half.
 To make this time it has brought the
 track to high efficiency. The reduced
 time, the absence of smoke and dust,
 and the frequent service have done
 their work—the line gets the busi-
 ness.

It has done more. It has widened
 the zone of suburban homes. All
 along the route it has forced subdivi-
 sion of big land holdings. It has
 made several homes where there was
 but one before. It has placed a multi-
 tude of people on the land.

The change is the mere working
 out of the law of eternal fitness. It is
 the way nature expected things ulti-
 mately to be in the Willamette Valley.
 The electric road was to be the per-
 fected form of inter-city movement.
 It was to be the call of the modern
 farmer to settle on a small tract from
 which the city could be reached
 cheaply, quickly and conveniently.

It is a law of change that cannot
 be set aside or its effect kept back.
 It is a fixed and inexorable law, and
 one that is going to become immedi-
 ately effective.

Mr. Hill is building electric lines
 in the Willamette Valley. It is the fit
 order. It is the plan in harmony with
 the decree of fate itself. The Harri-
 man people will have to meet this
 kind of competition or lose the busi-
 ness.

The old Harriman lines on the west
 side will have to be rebuilt. The old
 rails will have to be discarded. The
 old go-as-you-please trains will have
 to go into the scrap heap. The old
 frontier schedule, but little removed
 from the once-a-day mixed train of a
 quarter of a century ago, will have to
 be abandoned. The Harriman inter-
 ests will have to get into step with
 the new order, or live to count the
 losses of a swiftly disappearing busi-
 ness.

All this is consequential to Port-
 land and the Willamette Valley. It
 means quick transit, smaller farms,
 more people, better homes, more con-
 veniences, greater wealth, enlarged
 importance and a growing civiliza-
 tion.

It was a great day when James J.
 Hill decided to enter Oregon. It
 started the Willamette Valley on the
 way to empire.—Oregon Journal.

SUICIDE BY GAS ROUTE WAS THIS MAN'S RESORT

President of Portland Artificial Limb
 Concern, Despondent Over Finan-
 cial Matters, Tries to End His Ex-
 istence

PORTLAND, Dec. 4.—G. M. Mc-
 Daniel, president of the Peerless Ar-
 tificial Limb company, 2408 First
 avenue, Seattle, attempted suicide at
 the Hotel Ramapo by placing the end
 of a gas hose to his mouth, locking
 himself in a closet and burying his
 head under a blanket. The hose was
 pulled into the closet through a hole
 that McDaniel had dug in the closet
 door with a penknife.

The hotel clerk to whom McDaniel
 gave orders to be called at 7 o'clock,
 on his failure to receive any answer
 to his summons, broke down the door
 and found the man in the closet al-
 most dead. The police and a doctor
 were summoned and the man was or-
 dered to St. Vincent's hospital, where
 it is said he will recover.
