CURBING INDUSTRIAL DISEASE

INDUSTRIAL disease come about in
 two ways: Special industries give
 rise to their own peculiar ailments, as
 "phossy jaw" among matchmakers,
 lead, arsenic or mercury poisoning,
 calisson disease and the like. In the
 second place, special industries render
 the workmen susceptible to cer-
 tain common types of disease; as
 when laborers in dust-evolving trades
 succumb to tuberculosis and pneu-
 monia. Among disease-engendering
 occupations are glass blowing, work
 in cotton factories, the work which
 young girls must do in the trimming
 rooms of packing establishments, at
 a temperature lower than that gen-
 erally obtaining in refrigerators, the
 nystagmus inducing work of miners,
 trades inducing specific infections,
 such as anthrax, and so forth.

Ignorance of the value of measures
 of safety and considerations of profit
 and loss combine in varying propor-
 tions to depress the health and take
 the lives of workers. Whether the
 employer really saves money or only
 thinks he saves it, at the expense of
 the lives and health of his employees,
 is practically immaterial, except that
 in the latter case he must be edu-
 cated, and in the former he must be
 penalized. The Journal of the Ameri-
 can Medical Association discusses the
 question of the most effective means
 of dealing with this problem, and
 says it is one which this country as
 yet has done little to answer.

By commissions, by clinics especial-
 ly devoted to industrial disease, by
 state appointed medical inspectors, by
 periodical examinations of working
 people, and by the passing of employ-
 ers' liability and compensation acts,
 very much may be done. The ascer-
 tainment of facts and their wide pub-
 lication are most essential measures,
 for above all else, a humane popular
 sentiment must be aroused. Then the
 really civilized portion of the body
 politic may fall in line with organiza-
 tions akin to the National Consumers'
 League, which refuses to purchase
 such products as have been ascer-
 tained to be sweated out of the blood
 and the lives of their fellow beings.
