## CHEAPER CABLEGRAMS IN VOGUE FOR SOME MATTERS

New Arrangement for European Messages About on Par With Domestic Day and Night Letter Service by Telegraph

Theodore N. Vail, president of the Western Union Telegraph company, made public the plan to institute cable letters and week-end letters, much in the same manner as the lines now furnish the public with day and night letter service. By this arrangement the Atlantic cables are placed within reach of the public at rates which will encourage their greater use for social and business communications.

The new service is intended to create a new field for the transmission to Europe and vice versa of lengthy communications which are not of such pressing urgency as to warrant the cost of the regular expedited cables. The arrangement is based upon the use of the cable facilities at times when the loads caused by the expedited cables is lightest.

Cable letters and week end letters may be filed from now on at any open Western Union office at any hour, from whence they will be forwarded to the cable terminal at New York city or at Boston. The cable letter may be mailed from the office at which it is filed to either one of the above cities provided the additional delay can be assumed by the sender, but upon the Pacific coast practically all letters of this character will be sent by wire to either New York or Boston, from which points they will be routed to destinations in Europe, so as to reach London or Liverpool in time for delivery on the morning of the second day following their receipt at New York or Boston.

The week end letters may be filed at open Western Union offices up to midnight on Saturday for delivery at London or Liverpool on the following Tuesday morning. Of course they may be filed before Saturday, but they will not be delivered until Tuesday. Both cable letters and week end letters will be written in plain English language.

In establishing a rate for the cable transmission for cable letters the company has made a very marked reduction, the rate for such letters, covering the cable transmission alone being but \$1.50 for twenty words, with 30 cents added for each additional five words. For week end letters the cable transmission will be \$1.50 for thirty words, with 25 cents added for each additional five words. These rates also include the delivery of both characters of letters at London or Liverpool.

One of the principal features of the new arrangement is the delivery by mail of these cable letters at destinations outside of London and Liverpool, but the telegraph company has arranged so that the sending of the letters may have them handled by telegraph beyond London or Liverpool by the additional payment of 1 cent per word to points in Great Britain and Ireland, or by the pay-

ment of the regular telegraphic word rates to other points beyond London, which rates may be ascertained at all Western Union offices. Parties wishing to send these cable letters and week end letters have the privilege of using either the regular day message, the day letter or the night letter in transmitting the cable messages to New York or Boston to be cabled.

The whole plan contemplates, of course, the same character of service from Europe to the United States. The names which have been selected to the two characters of service handled by wire are "letterwire" and "weekwire." Commencing December 9th deferred press dispatches in plain English language for publication in the papers of this country will be transmitted over the Atlantic cables at 7 cents per word, plus the newspaper special rate from New York or Boston to destination for both day and night service, and for publication abroad the cable rate will be the same, but a lower rate will obtain upon the inland lines of the United States. . . .

President Vail stated that on January next there will be inaugurated another novel service to be designated the "deferred cable" service, full information in regard to which will be announced later. This plan will not modify the cable letter or week end letter arrangements, but will be an additional service which will have its uses in connection with cable business capable of sustaining a certain amount of delay which will be determined in advance and will yet permit of a more extended use of the cables in certain classes of correspondence. Since the Western Union has acquired exclusive control of the Atlantic cables no time has been lost in working out a scheme under which they may be used in connection with the day letter and night letter inaugurated by the company in the United States, and the announced plan brings into existence under certain conditions a reduction of almost 50 per cent in cable tolls.
