THE STOKES PERFORATIONS

NOW that the case of W. D. Stokes,
 the New York millionaire round-
 er and chorus girl chaser, against
 Ethel Conrad and Lillian Graham,
 particularly the latter, is over, all the
 excitement incident to the trial will
 die down.

But the echoes will not fade away
 until there are numerous expressions
 on the part of readers of details of
 the affair as to their satisfaction on
 the outcome of the case. The jury
 acquitted the young women, and the
 crowds who had watched the court
 proceedings to a windup gave vent to
 their feelings in yells of joy and warm
 congratulations extended to the pair
 of girls who were freed by the jury.

It's the old, old story of the wrong-
 ed girl and the rich man with the
 upper hand, and the conclusion
 reached by the twelve men who de-
 termined the case was possibly based
 to a certain extent on a branch of the
 unwritten law.

According to the verdict of the jury
 some may infer that the jury consid-
 ered, as do they, that Stokes got what
 he deserved, while others believe that
 Stokes grabbed one of the young wo-
 men in an effort to choke her before
 he had perforations made in his
 nether limbs by bullets from a revol-
 ver held and shot by Lillian Graham,
 his one time innamorata. In the latter
 case the girl was justified in shooting
 on the ground of self defense alone.

But in any event the general sym-
 pathy for Stokes, if any there be, is
 mighty little. He might as well left
 off any dealings with Miss Graham
 when he got married, but it appears
 that he had not burned his bridges be-
 hind him, and was hoping to get his
 clutches on some old letters that had
 been written by him to her prior to
 his marriage.

Just what measure of wrong he had
 done the girl is hard to make out, but
 that he was an admirer of hers in a
 sense that was hardly legitimate ap-
 pears to be plain. He is twice her
 age, and met her when she was in her
 teens, thus making her an easy
 prey to his experienced wiles, added
 to his wealth and ability to spend
 money on her in a reckless way.

Some people are even mean enough
 to express regret that Miss Graham
 did not pump a bullet into a section
 of Mr. Stokes' physique which would
 have had a more severe effect than
 merely to lay him up for a day or
 two.

proof of the debt may be hard to es-
 tablish.

Then again there are persons, espe-
 cially women, whose natural diffi-
 dence about figuring in the notoriety
 of a court trial, holds them back from
 trying to get their rights.

Others refrain from due process of
 law because of what they believe is
 an expense that is too heavy to be
 borne by them, especially in case they
 lose their suit.

Some are deterred from taking
 their matters into court from the fact
 that the machinery of the law is sub-
 ject to delays, some of which are fear-
 ful and wonderful, and in practically
 few of which there any good com-
 mon sense.

It is a great pity that the law can
 not be further removed from the mis-
 erable human equation of rottenness
 in the individual.

The spectacle of comparative
 minor matters being dragged along in
 courts year after year, at what ap-
 pears to be a most disgraceful and
 outrageous expense is not a healthy
 one.

The instances of injustice in this
 direction, instead of the justice that
 is due to the litigants, are numerous
 and deplorable.

While the law makes many things
 optional with the judge, there are
 some places where he should be com-
 pelled to exercise the initiative, for
 instance, toward getting suits tried
 or striking them forever from the
 docket. If not this then there should
 be a statutory regulation to provide
 for the trying of law suits within a
 certain period after they are com-
 menced save in certain instances made
 exempt for good and sufficient rea-
 sons well established.
