REAL GUM SHOE WORKERS SLEUTHS OF DEPARTMENTS

Of Justice, Which Never Counts
 Exploits or Reveals Names of Its
 Men, Whose Vocation in Life Is the
 Pursuit of Wily Criminals

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—
 The government has turned the se-
 cret service force of the department
 of justice loose on the trail of the
 dynamite conspirators. This is the
 real secret service corps of the United
 States. Its operatives are altogether
 the most silent, least advertised, least
 known, most efficient and terrible set
 of man-hunters in this country, and
 probably more efficient than any for-
 eign body of secret agents.

It is the policy of the government
 never to give out the number or the
 names of the department of justice
 secret service agents, never to recount
 their exploits or reveal their methods.
 Chief Wilkie's corps in the treasury
 department catches counterfeiters and
 guards the president, and deeds of its
 members are widely known. The
 postoffice inspectors are quiet when at
 work, but after the arrest is made
 they become court witnesses and the
 stories of their exploits are told.

But the department of justice de-
 tectives always remain hidden. They
 have the widest range of activities of
 any government force of sleuths. To-
 day an agent may effect the capture of
 some wretched thief in an outlying
 government office; tomorrow he may
 start on the track of a red-handed
 murderer on the high seas; next
 spring he may be the suave clubman
 and society favorite whose clever op-
 erations bring to bar the record-
 destroying trust magnate. But his iden-
 tity is never revealed.

One day a tall gentleman, impec-
 cably clothed in hard-worn gray
 trousers, frock coat and silk hat,
 gloved and gaitered, enters the
 department of justice building, swinging
 a slender walking stick. A clerk may
 whisper to you that he is so-and-so,
 secret agent. And it gives you a
 glimpse of what the service is. This
 agent can play the society dandy or
 foreign nobleman if necessary to his
 purpose. Or he can get into a jumper
 and overalls, crop his hair, and be
 able to catch some desperate fugitive
 from justice. It's all in his line of
 work.

The headquarters of the kid glove
 service is in an upper room in the
 department of justice building. It is a
 Spartan-like room, ragless and with
 cheap oak furniture, entirely unlike
 the luxurious offices in the rest of the
 building. Stanley W. Finch is chief
 of the service. His desk is littered
 with reports and photographs of men
 wanted. He receives a constant string
 of telegrams and long distance tele-
 phone messages from his agents. The
 number of his force is not known, but
 it is probably about 150.

HUNDRED YEARS OF WORK ENOUGH, SAYS HALF-BREED

He Is Claimed to Be 114 Years Old,
 and to Have Done a Solid Century
 of Work at the Hardest Kind of
 Labor

 GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., Dec. 18.
 "One hundred years of work is
 enough for any man," declared "Cher-
 okee Bill," an Indian-negro, who is
 retired today after working at the
 hardest kind of labor since he was 14
 years old, and who is now 114.

According to the United States cen-
 sus he is the oldest man in America.
 "I wanted to retire with \$100,000
 to my credit," he continued, "but I
 can't make it."

He is, however, reputed to be worth
 \$75,000. For the last year Bill has
 been working in the Grand Junction
 coal yards, shovelling forty tons of
 coal a day.

"I'll be willing to die at 125," he
 says. "That'll give me a little on
 Solomon's actual age."

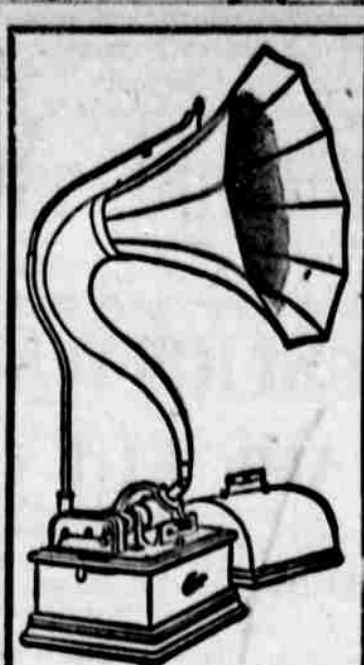
