WOMAN TWICE A BRIDE MAY STILL BE SPINSTER

Court Case Shows That She May Be Either Wife of Both, Spouse of But One, or Helpmeet of Neither of the Gentlemen

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—An odd action on file in the superior court here shows how a woman might be the wife of either of two men, or the wife of neither, or the wife of both at the same time, and therefore technically single or a bigamist simultaneously. The suit was instituted by Mrs. M. McCulston of Los Angeles. She wanted a divorce from both William McCulston and William J. Paschall, and also asked that her marriage to the former be annulled.
 The case extends over twenty years. The woman married Paschall first, but obtained a divorce from him less than a year after she had lived in a state other than the one in which she had been married thus nullifying the action. Not knowing that she was still Mrs. Paschall, she married McCulston, whom, in turn, she divorced. McCulston, however, succeeded in having the decree set aside on his own account. When she discovered that both actions were inoperative, Mrs. McCulston began her present suit. If they are won by her she will be actually single, though there still will remain the question of property settlement, and the prospects of her asking for double alimony.

SURF ENGULFS GIRLS, BRAVE ESCORT RESCUES

Four Person Narrowly Escape From Drowning at Newport, in Sea Which Has Been Unusually Rough of Late

NEWPORT, Ore., Dec. 21.—Sunday morning a party of four persons narrowly escaped death by drowning near the Monterey hotel, about a mile and a half north of here.
 The party consisted of John Savage and son, Royal, of Talent, Ore.; Miss Hattie Beckley and Miss Angie Walrad of Newport. The surf being very high the four, waiting their chance, started to run around a point between waves. All except Mr. Savage, who is a heavy man, made it in safety.
 Missing him the other three started back to find him, but were caught midway. Young Savage managed to get hold of Miss Walrad and hold her until the wave receded, Miss Beckley, who was further from the rocks, having meanwhile disappeared in the breakers.
 Having placed Miss Walrad in safety, Savage caught a glimpse of Miss Beckley's red hat, and bravely plunged in. They were carried out at first, but the older Savage, seeing what was happening, rushed into the water, and after a desperate struggle with the strong undertow, managed to pull the half-drowned girl ashore.
 The two young women undoubtedly owe their lives to the bravery and presence of mind to Royal Savage.
 The surf has been unusually rough lately, and this is the fourth accident of this nature in two weeks. Last year Lightkeeper Wilson was engulfed with his horse and wagon at this same spot, and only the sagacity of the horse saved Mr. Wilson from drowning.
