WOMAN TWICE A BRIDE MAY STILL BE SPINSTER

Court Case Shows That She May Be
Either Wife of Both, Spouse of But
One, or Helpmeet of Neither of the
Gentlemen

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—Sunday
morning a party of four persons nar-
rowly escaped death by drowning near
the Monterey hotel, about a mile and
a half north of here.

The party consisted of John Savage
and son, Royal, of Talent, Ore.; Miss
Hattie Beckley and Miss Angie Wal-
rad of Newport. The surf being very
high the four, waiting their chance
started to run around a point between
waves. All except Mr. Savage, who
is a heavy man, made it in safety.

Missing him the other three started
back to find him, but were caught
midway. Young Savage managed to
get hold of Miss Walrad and hold her
until the wave receded, Miss Beckley,
who was further from the rocks, having
meanwhile disappeared in the
breakers.

Having placed Miss Walrad in safety,
Savage caught a glimpse of Miss
Beckley's red hat, and bravely plun-
ged in. They were carried out at first,
but the older Savage, seeing what was
happening, rushed into the water,
and after a desperate struggle with
the strong undertow, managed to pull
the half drowned girl ashore.

The two young women undoubtedly
owe their lives to the bravery and
presence of mind of Royal Savage.

The surf has been unusually rough
lately, and this is the fourth accident
of this nature in two weeks. Last
year Lightkeeper Wilson was en-
gulfed with his horse and wagon at
this same spot, and only the sagacity of
the horse saved Mr. Wilson from
drowning.

SURF ENGULFS GIRLS, BRAVE ESCORT RESCUES

Four Person Narrowly Escape From
Drowning at Newport, in Sea Which

NEWPORT, Ore., Dec. 21.—Sunday
