RAILROAD CASE JURY DISAGREES

STOOD SIX TO SIX ON THE QUESTION OF CONTRIBUTORY NEGLIGENCE BY THE SERVANT OF THE PLAINTIFF

No agreement could be reached by the jury in the case of the Farmers' Implement and Supply Co. vs. Southern Pacific Railroad Co., so after they had been out from 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon until about 2 o'clock this morning Judge Percy R. Kelly, being assured by Foreman G. H. Carleton that an agreement could not be reached, discharged the jury. Whether a new trial will be asked by the plaintiff through its attorney, J. C. Rutenic, could not be learned today.

The jury stood flatly 6 to 6 after numerous ballots. The difference between the jurors hinged on the question of contributory negligence by the driver of the rig in leaving his team with the lines tied to the dray. It was while he was absent from the team under these circumstances that the flying switch was made which killed one horse and damaged the dray and harness.

The jury had been instructed that if there was negligence by the railroad company in causing the accident the company would be exempt from liability if the plaintiff's servant had been guilty of contributory negligence. Half the jury believed that it was not negligence on the driver's part, but those who were familiar with teaming said that the course taken by the team was such as gentle horses would be expected to take under the circumstances, to step up a little, and then finding the lines tightening, back for leeway. This the team did, getting the rig up toward the track.

ASSORT LAND BY VALUE, IN PLEA OF SECRETARY

Head of Interior Department Urges That Congress Ought to Take an Active Interest in Amending Defective Laws, Which He Can Not Do

ST. PAUL, Dec. 21.—The great need of the time is a system of classifying public land according to real value, according to Secretary of the Interior Fisher, who spoke before the congress of Western governors here. Secretary Fisher urged the fact that his office has no power to correct the many faults of the land laws, and showed that congress should take an active interest in amending defective laws.

In suggesting reforms in the mining laws, Secretary Fisher advocated abolishing the power of attorney and the apex theory of the mining laws. As outlined by Governor Morris of Montana, the sense of the meeting was in favor of the following propositions:

To expedite reclamation and reduce wherever possible the cost to the settler.

To expedite examination and classification of withdrawn lands and eliminate from withdrawal the areas found not to be valuable for the purposes for which it had been withdrawn.

To expedite the survey of the entire public domain.

So far as possible, to remove the restrictions that are vexatious to the settler in making annual and final proofs of title.

That the proposed leasing of power sites and of mineral lands be made not for federal revenue, but for state revenue, if any revenue is to be received; and to prevent any restrictions not necessary to prevent exploitation by large interests.

Settlers should be allowed at certain points on forest reserves for the purpose of constructing fire breaks.

With the address of Secretary Fisher at the Minnesota Club, the eastern trip of the Western governors ended and the congress officially came to a close.

DOCTORS OF GASTRONOMY RAILROADS WILL TURN OUT

Southern Pacific Hires Expert to Superintend Work of Chefs on Dining Cars, and to Teach Them to Prepare Tempting Dishes

The chefs on the diners of the Southern Pacific company are being taught to be more finished cooks. They know how to cook, but a cook can always learn something new, and one of the famous hotel chefs of the country is professor in a cooking school for cooks that has just been established in the Southern Pacific dining car department. Ernest Hauslein, late chef at the Holland house of New York, who led the New York bankers' party during its 1910 trip to the American bankers' convention at Los Angeles, is the instructor in this new institution of learning.

He is making the Southern Pacific dining car service uniform. All of the chefs are to learn how to cook the most tempting dishes. Scientific management in the kitchen is also a feature of the course. A degree of doctor of culinary art will probably be given at the end of each course, although the length of the course has not yet been decided upon.

Every dining car crew, as it reaches Oakland yards of the Southern Pacific, is turned over to the chef, and until it starts on another trip across the continent or up or down the coast the cooks are being taught how to prepare new and fancy dishes that will tickle the palate of the most fastidious gourmet. Each dining car crew, which consists of a chef, a first, second and third cook, prepares a meal just before it starts out on a trip. This meal, prepared under the direction of Hauslein, is served by that crew on its next run.

Hauslein does not remain at Oakland, however. He bears the title of "traveling chef," and he spends several days at the different commissaries of the company each month. Since the 1st of December he has had about thirty crews from the company, and he has taught them new methods of preparing soups, salads, sauces, garnishes, entrees, roasts and desserts. Not that they did not know these things before, but he is adding to their lists of accomplishments in these lines. Some of the original recipes are now in course of preparation by Hauslein, and he has promised them for the women's pages of the papers of the West.

SUMMONS In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Klamath County.

Lizzie Orr, Plaintiff, vs. George H. Orr, Defendant.

To George H. Orr, the above-named defendant:

In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, on or before the 30th day of December, A. D. 1911, that being the last day within which defendant is allowed to answer herein, as fixed by the order of the court for publication of summons herein; and if you fail so to appear and answer, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in the complaint filed herein, to wit: For a decree and order of the court: That the bonds of matrimony now existing between plaintiff and defendant be forever dissolved; that plaintiff have the custody of the minor child, Rebecca Orr, of plaintiff and defendant; that defendant pay the sum of fifteen dollars per month for the support of said child; that defendant be restrained from in any manner interfering with the personal liberty of the plaintiff or said minor child or plaintiff's custody of said child; and for such other relief as to the court shall seem just and proper.
