UNWARRANTED "EXPANSION"

INFORMATION has reached the
 Herald to the effect that a new
 commercial organization for Klamath
 Falls is now in embryo. The fathers
 of the movement are up to the pres-
 ent time doing all they can to keep
 the fact of their endeavor and the
 aims and intentions of their organiza-
 tion a secret.

It seems to the Herald as though
 this method of working for an object
 which is to benefit the city and its
 people generally is hardly likely to
 prove the best way. If the object is
 a public one it would seem a more
 logical mode of working to sound the
 tocsin and get everybody in the pro-
 ceedings that it would be possible to
 secure.

The gumshoe campaign is all right
 in some instances—politics, or some
 aim or endeavor, for instance—but
 in an action for the benefit of the
 public the public wishes to know, and
 is likewise from Missouri in that it
 wishes to be shown. It wants a
 demonstration with no light hidden
 under a bushel.

Whether another commercial or-
 ganization in Klamath Falls would be
 a good thing is probably open to ques-
 tion. The Chamber of Commerce has
 been doing business at the old stand
 for some time and bids fair to con-
 tinue working without hindrance for
 an indefinite time.

Whether the element which seeks
 the formation of another organiza-
 tion for similar ends is a general ele-
 ment of the business men of the
 city, or is a crowd of those interest-
 ed in some particular line of develop-
 ment the Herald is naturally unable
 to state, owing to the fact that those
 directly concerned in launching the
 new movement have not cared to
 make any pronouncements of their
 plans.

Whether there is some dissatisfac-
 tion with the present Chamber of
 Commerce by business men for reasons
 best known to themselves does
 not appear.

ut the fact remains that the en-
 deavor to organize is in the crucible,
 and will, in course of time, possibly,
 be made plain to all, unless the calcu-
 lations go a-glimmering.

Only time will tell just what ele-
 ment of the local citizenship is be-
 hind the movement, and the basis on
 which it expects to form a commercial
 alliance.

But one thing stands out, plain and
 unobscured:
 That is that one Chamber of Com-
 merce or similar body is all that
 Klamath Falls can be expected to
 support, and whatever has brought
 about the feeling that another body

of the kind might occupy the field is
 to be regretted.

Klamath Falls has 6,000 people,
 approximately, and is a growing,
 busy, little city, but this is by no
 means justification for two expansion
 bodies of the kind indicated.

It looks as if the tendency to over-
 do things was too great. This city
 has three daily newspapers, when one
 good one could thrive here and be a
 favored business enterprise. It has
 a faction of people who are interested
 in pulling the growth of the town in
 one direction and another faction that
 is interested in pulling it another
 way. If you don't like the word fac-
 tion use your own substitute. The
 fact will remain.

It has more saloons than are pro-
 vided for or lawful under its city
 charter.

Other directions could be men-
 tioned in which the "growth" is re-
 trotable.

The halting place will have to be
 reached some time, and in the opinion
 of the Herald the sooner this city
 comes to it the better.
