**FARM STATION SITE GIVEN  
 BY COUNTY TO COLLEGE**

Jackson Poor Farm Site Partly Made  
 Present for Use of New Southern  
 Oregon Branch, Eight Miles South  
 of City of Medford

**CORVALLIS, Dec. 26.**—Twenty-  
 five acres of land with \$2,500 of  
 buildings, formerly part of the Jack-  
 son county poor farm, has been de-  
 cided to the Oregon Agricultural col-  
 lege by the county for use for the new  
 Southern Oregon branch experiment  
 station, eight miles south of Medford  
 and half a mile east of Talent, on the  
 main county road.

As there are four distinct types of  
 soil on the property, some of the most  
 important commercially in the Rogue  
 River Valley, this is an unusually well  
 adapted site for experimental work.  
 There are two different types of the  
 Bear Creek River bottom soils, which  
 are good examples of the soil in the  
 valley flats, and two upland soils of a  
 more gravelly type, which represents  
 the hillside soils in the western part  
 of the valley. A spring with a per-  
 petual flow has made it possible to  
 have over half the acreage under ir-  
 rigation at present.

Some ten acres of different soils  
 be planted to different varieties of  
 fruit trees this winter, and extensive  
 experiments in truck gardening will  
 be carried on between the trees and in  
 the bottom land. A large amount of  
 experimental work relative to South-  
 ern Oregon conditions has already  
 been carried on by the college with a  
 co-operation of the growers of the  
 valley, and bulletins on irrigation,  
 frost fighting and pruning have been  
 issued, based on these experiments.

**FANCY COOKING TAUGHT IN  
 AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE**

Not Only Are Young Women Being  
 Instructed in Culinary Matters, But  
 Are Given Instruction as to Mod-  
 ern Draping of Chapeaus

**LONDON, Dec. 26.**—The Hon. Mrs.  
 Milam of the domestic science depart-  
 ment of the Oregon Agricultural col-  
 lege has just announced a new course  
 in fancy cooking, in addition to the  
 work previously announced for the  
 short course.

The new course will cover the fol-  
 lowing subjects: Vegetable cookery,  
 casserole cookery, meats, meat and  
 vegetable salads, fruit salads, the use  
 of gelatin, frozen products and after-  
 noon teas.

The domestic science department  
 also announces the return this year  
 of Nancy Wallace Dodds, who gave  
 the instruction last year in the popu-  
 lar course in millinery, in which the  
 short course students learned to de-  
 sign, make and trim their own Paris-  
 ian creations.

A course in food preparation, a spe-  
 cial food course on the selection and  
 preparation of foods for children, in-  
 valids, the aged, and people in active  
 life, a course in the principles of  
 laundering, two courses in home man-  
 agement, courses in plain sewing and  
 in dressmaking are also to be given  
 this year from January 3 to Febru-  
 ary 3.

**CHRISTMAS PLUM PUDDING  
 RECEIPT BY PORTLAND GIRL**

Senior Pupils in Domestic Science De-  
 partment of State Agricultural Col-  
 lege Give Her Conception of Irre-  
 sistible Culinary Comp

**CORVALLIS, Dec. 26.**—How to  
 make a Christmas plum pudding is  
 told by Miss Keran Davis of Port-  
 land, a senior in the domestic science  
 department at the Oregon Agricul-  
 tural college in an article on "Christ-  
 mas Cookies and Plum Pudding," in  
 the December Oregon Countryman.

The ingredients, which are to be  
 combined in the order given and  
 steamed four hours, are as follows:

Three eggs, three cups flour, one  
 cup chopped suet, half cup candied  
 lemon, one cup each of molasses and  
 sweet milk, one teaspoon each of soda  
 and salt, one cup of citron, one-third  
 teaspoon spices, one cup raisins, two  
 teaspoons cream tartar, one cup cur-  
 rants, one cup brown sugar.

**BLEACH TEETH WHITE IS  
 FRENCH DOCTORS INTENT**

Covers Face of Patient With Thick  
 Mask Which Hides All But Dental  
 Division, and Electricity or Sun-  
 light Does the Rest

 be bleached as white as snow by elec-  
 tricity or sunlight, Dr. Pierre Rogent-

 light is then focused on the teeth.
