MONTH MORE FOR STEEL PEOPLE TO ANSWER SUIT

Extension of Time Granted Metal Corporation to Respond to Government's Move for Its Discontinuance

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 23.—United States District Attorney Vreeland, in the United States Circuit Court, announced that a further extension of time had been granted for the filing of answers for the dissolution of the United States Steel corporation. The time was extended from the first Monday in January to February 1 in the case of the United States Steel corporation itself and for twenty-five or thirty other defendants in the case.

The extension was granted by Vreeland with the approval of the department of justice.

The only defendant out of the entire sixteen who have not asked for an extension of time are John D. Rockefeller and John D. Rockefeller junior.

The Minnesota groups of mining and land companies secured an extension some time ago to January 15, and thus far they have not asked for further time. It is believed all of the defendants who ask for it will have their time for filing answers extended to February 1st.

BOMB EXPLOSION CAUSES MOSLEM-BULGAR BATTLE

Explosive Outrage at Ishtib, Which Kills Two Turkish Functionaries, Leads to Conflict in Which Scores Are Killed and Wounded

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Dec. 23.—Despite the blockade by Turkish troops of Ishtib and the censorship which Turkey has placed upon news from the troubled districts, it is possible to construct a connected narrative from the statements of refugees arriving here from there.

December 4th a bomb exploded in the market place near the Shadavan mosque, killing two Turkish functionaries, wounding a Bulgarian shopkeeper and partially wrecking the mosque. The Moslem population then attacked the Bulgars, and 180 persons were killed and wounded. Hundreds of houses were looted. A patrol of Turkish soldiers joined with the Moslem mob, using their bayonets on the Bulgars. The battle lasted five hours.

Attacks have also been made upon the Bulgars in the villages of mixed population in the neighborhood. A state of siege has been proclaimed at Ishtib. The refugees scout the idea that the outrages were inspired by the Italian government, though the veil of Salonika assures the correspondents of foreign newspapers that the Italian government suborned four persons to commit these crimes by an outlay of \$50,000.

Public opinion in the Balkans, turning a deaf ear to the arguments of Turkey that Italy is the trouble maker, is inclined to lay the blame for the disturbances at the door of Austria, whose grab of Bosnia and Herzegovina will for many years serve as a warning to the other Balkan states to beware of the territorial ambitions of Emperor Franz Josef.

MONARCHY OR REPUBLIC IS QUESTION IN CHINA

Imperial Edict Assents to Convention to Determine Problem When Imperial Premier Yuan Shi Kai Declares It Is Last Resort for Peace.

 SHANGHAI, Dec. 23.—An imperial edict assents to a national convention to decide on a monarchy or republic.

It orders the cabinet to decide on election laws, directs Tang Shao Yi to consult with Wu Ting Fang for a suspension of hostilities.

Yuan Shi Kai informed the throne that the convention is the only salvation, and if it refused it was his last effort.

The edict practically means a republic will be established and the throne will be abolished.

NO DYNAMITE INDICTMENTS BY FEDERAL GRAND JURY

McNamara Detective Charged With Bribery Is Held to Superior Court's Action in Bain Case, and Is Free on Own Recognizance

 LOS ANGELES, Dec. 23.—The federal grand jury reported to United States Judge Wellborn yesterday afternoon and returned several indictments, none of which refer to the dynamite cases, it is said.

With the report filed the jurors returned immediately to the investigation of dynamite cases.

The report is secret.

Bert Franklin, former McNamara detective charged with juror bribing was today held for action of the superior court in the Bain case.

In this case he was held on his own recognizance, as he is out on a \$10,000 bond in the Lockwood bribing case.

The defense rested its case without submitting any evidence at the preliminary hearing.
