CHILDREN TO TILL SOIL

FOR the purpose of introducing ed-
 ucation in farming among the
 school children of the state a meeting
 will be held at Corvallis during the
 middle of January by representatives
 of the State Bankers Association, the
 Portland Commercial Club and the
 Oregon Development League. State
 Superintendent of Public Instruction
 Alderman is thoroughly in sympathy
 with the plans and the Oregon Agri-
 cultural college, too, will co-operate
 in every possible way.

The desire is to spread the work of
 the state agricultural college over the
 entire state, and arrangements for the
 meeting to be held at Corvallis were
 made at a conference held recently
 in Portland. The exact date will be
 fixed later. It will be attended by
 President J. W. Kerr of the Oregon
 Agricultural college, Superintendent
 L. R. Alderman, Emory Olmstead,
 chairman of the state bankers' com-
 mittee on agricultural development
 and education; C. C. Chapman, sec-
 retary of the Oregon Development
 League; Professor R. D. Hetzel, di-
 rector of the extension work of the O.
 A. C., and others.

Superintendent Alderman is now
 laying out a course of study that will

probably be adopted at the Corvallis
 meeting. Plans for the most complete
 development of the work will be dis-
 cussed, and all arrangements made to
 launch a statewide campaign.

A date will be named for the simul-
 taneous meeting of commercial clubs
 of the state, at which the matter of
 agricultural education will be discus-
 sed, the local membership interested
 and arrangements made for visiting
 the schools in each locality on a fu-
 ture date, when speakers will describe
 the new courses of study to the pu-
 pils and secure their co-operation.

"We regard this as the most im-
 portant of all development work,"
 says Emory Olmstead. "We must be-
 gin with the children in the effort to
 turn the tide back toward the farms
 and away from the cities. By teach-
 ing the children profitable agricul-
 tural methods they will not want to
 leave the farm for town, but will stay
 on the soil and will prosper."

"The plan of the bankers is to co-
 operate with the various educational
 agencies at work rather than to out-
 line a policy of our own. The bank-
 ers will finance the work to some ex-
 tent by raising funds to keep one man
 in the field who will work to interest
 boys and girls in farming, as well as
 visit school boards and teachers in
 the various localities and enlist their
 aid in the work."

Members of the special committee
 named by the State Bankers' Associa-
 tion to introduce agricultural educa-
 tion in the schools of the state are:
 Emory Olmstead, Portland; T. J. Ma-
 honey, Heppner; J. H. Booth, Rose-
 burg; J. H. Albert, Salem; C. A. De-
 bell, Corvallis.

C. C. Chapman, promotion manager
 for the Commercial Club and secre-
 tary of the Oregon Development
 League, gives assurance of the fullest
 co-operation of these two bodies in
 the work.

"If there is anything the Commer-
 cial Club has worked for consistently,
 in and out of season," said he, "it is
 just such movements as this one. In-
 tended to restore the even balance be-
 tween town and country, and relieve

the congestion of our over-crowded
 population centers by getting people
 on the soil. I regard this work of the
 first importance, and will aid in
 every possible way to further it.

"In part, the plan of farming educa-
 tion so far mapped out calls for the
 use of pamphlets issued by the Ore-
 gon Agricultural college as text books.
 The course of study will be formulat-
 ed definitely by Superintendent Alder-
 man. It is expected contests will be
 arranged between school children that
 will add to the interest, and the prize
 exhibits will be placed at the county
 and district fairs, and sent to the
 state fair.

"We hope to arrange for a simulta-
 neous meeting of all commercial
 bodies of the state to consider the
 plan and to enlist speakers to visit the
 schools of the state. These dates will
 be fixed later."
