FAULDER TRIAL WAITS A MONTH

CIRCUIT COURT GRANTS CONTINUANCE ON REPRESENTATIONS WHICH REVEAL INSANITY AS DEFENSE

In order to give Nobel Faulder, indicted for the first degree murder of Louis Gebhart last August, a chance to get witnesses to testify to his disordered tendencies mentally, Judge Henry L. Benson this afternoon granted his attorney, C. M. O'Neill, a continuance of the cases until February 19th.

Faulder's continuance was granted on representations of an affidavit made by his brother, Norman Faulder, who came here from Auckland, New Zealand, to help him. The affidavit says that arrangements have been made to secure the attendance of Bert Elder, who knows of hereditary insanity as a trait in ancestors of Faulder, and knows that Faulder himself has traces of mental disorder, being subject to fits of great nervousness, addicted to use of intoxicants and mentally irresponsible while indulging therein.

Gus Peterson, contractor who employed Faulder, is also sought to give testimony along the same lines.

District Attorney Dell V. Kuykendall, as two of the state's witnesses have disappeared, asked the court to set a time for taking depositions of the state's witness, and this was set for Tuesday next at 10 a. m.

CLEAN LIXEN FAMINE IS FACED BY NEW YORKERS

Strikers Have Thousands of New Recruits and Contagious Nature of Walkout Seems Likely to Carry It Into New Jersey

Twenty-five thousand laundry workers have struck, and 10,000 more will quit tonight.

Tomorrow it is expected that 64,000 will be quit, closing 600 steam laundries and 15,000 hand laundries in New York alone.

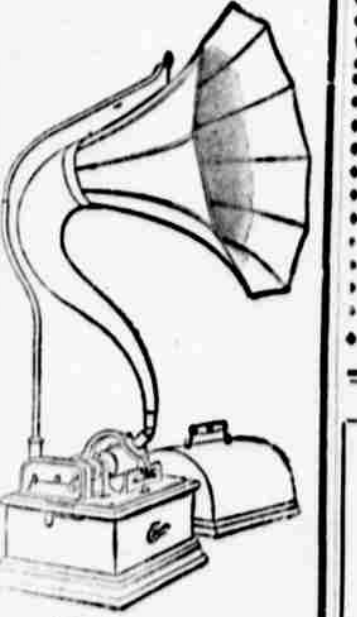
