CHAMBER ELECTION WARM CONTEST

past year, when the receipts were \$4,241.50, and expenditures \$4,679.79. The principal bill unpaid is that of the Sunset Magazine, \$673. President Reames urged upon the members the need of arranging to raise money in some more satisfactory way than by canvassing for subscriptions, which often failed of collection. Frank Ira White was called on to tell something of what he had ascertained on his trip to Washington for Klamath county last year, and when the question of factory sites was discussed mentioned that some of the eastern cities, especially in the region of Kansas City, offered factory sites under conditions that made the donees do something. In one case where a factory failed to fulfill its part of the contract the city sued and got damages.

The new vice president, W. Paul Johnson, moved that the Chamber of Commerce declare its intention of raising money to give a site to a box factory, for which Dorris is the greatest rival, having offered fifty acres near the railroad and track facilities. The motion prevailed, and during the evening over \$2,000 was subscribed to get the industry the land necessary. The box factory wants to get in the city limits, so Mr. Johnson suggested Shippington, which is in the city limits. The question was not raised as to Shippington. A site which has been considered for the concern is one near the railroad and lake, which is held at \$6,000.

County Judge William B. Worden reviewed some of the endeavors of the year past.

After the election the dinner was in order, and was an affair of taste, elegance and good things for the inner being, garnished with a "feast of reason and a flow of soul."

W. A. Deisell was an efficient toastmaster, first introducing Rev. J. B. Stubbfield, pastor of the Linkville Presbyterian church, to invoke the divine blessing. Secretary Caleb T. Oliver spoke on relation of the land owner to the Chamber of Commerce, urging the production of things that can be developed in the country rather than to import them. "Dairying and Hog Raising" was the topic of James Ezell. Letters from Fred Peterson, Bonanza school superintendent; James Pelton of the Wood River Valley, and Mark L. Burns of Dorris, scheduled to speak, were received. J. O. Hamaker, editor of the Bonanza Bulletin, speaking for Mr. Peterson. James O' Gara, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific at Sacramento, was not present, his place being taken by W. H. Wenzel, traveling passenger agent, who said that when the main line gets through this will no doubt be a division point, and bring 1,200 people a day through the city, many of whom will stop off. Trains will stop twenty minutes to half an hour. S. O. Johnson sent a letter; A. C. Wrenn of the Pioneer Press, spoke on Community Interests; W. O. Smith of the Herald on "The Press," and Edward J. Murray, owner of the Chronicle, down to talk on "Our Summer Resorts and Their Possibilities," left the banquet board early in the evening, and did not speak.
