## ATTORNEY GOES TO PEN EIGHT YEARS AT LABOR

Thieving Counsel Who Accepted \$15,000 Which a Former Postal Clerk Had Stolen, Gets Hard Down--Wife Under Indictment

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—Attorney Fred H. Thompson, who was convicted in the federal court two weeks ago of having taken \$15,000 from a former postal clerk who had stolen the money from the mails, was sentenced to eight years at hard labor at McNeil's Island, Washington, by Judge Olin Wellborn. He was also fined \$2,000.

The sentence followed a dramatic scene in the federal court when Thompson made a personal appeal for mercy. The convicted attorney declared that his shattered health would not withstand the rigors of prison, and that a suspended sentence would save his children from the stigma of having a convict father.

But Judge Wellborn replying, declared that the evidence showed that Thompson had been deliberately criminal, and that he had spent the proceeds of the crime in high living, in which the attorney's wife, Mrs. Etta Thompson, the court declared, had freely joined. Mrs. Thompson was also indicted, and is awaiting trial.

The court granted Thompson a two days' stay of execution, so that he might settle up all his affairs before going north to begin serving his sentence.

Thompson was convicted of having taken \$15,000 from Orlando F. Altorre, a postal clerk, who confessed to having stolen it from the mails, after declaring that Thompson had taken the money and deserted him. Altorre was pardoned, and was the principal witness against the attorney.

## WOULD ENLARGE DROUGHT BY CONGRESSIONAL ACTION

Anti-Saloon League Appeals to Ministers and Others on Four Propositions Which It Hopes to Further for the Reform

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—A letter is being issued by the Anti-Saloon League of the state to every clergyman in Oregon and many others, calling them to united action and specifying four things that the league claims need immediate action. These four propositions are stated as follows in the letter:

"First, congressional action correcting the abuse that has grown up in shipping liquor into dry territory under the protection of the interstate commerce law.

"Second, so amend the state constitution that it will be impossible to have a wet city in a dry county. The 'home rule' amendment and recent decisions of the supreme court make this imperative.

"Third, the selection of a legislature that is friendly, that adequate legislation can be expected, and unfriendly legislation defeated.

"Fourth, the enforcement of law, through personal effort and also through the election of men for these offices having to do with the interpretation and execution of law who can be depended upon to do their complete duty."

## MAYOR IN SCRAPPY MOOD OVER COUNCIL BALKING

Oregon City's Alcade, Whose Appointments Were Refused by City Solons Declares He Will File Them With the Recorder

OREGON CITY, Jan. 8.—Mayor Dimick, whose appointments the council refused to confirm, said that he would file the appointments with the city recorder. It is expected that the mayor will order his choice for chief of police, Charles B. Burns, to go to work. E. J. Shaw, the present chief, for whom the council fought, says he will continue to act as chief. The fight will be to the finish, it is thought.

## EDISON PICKS GREATEST ACHIEVEMENTS OF 1911

Puts at Head of List Discovery of Salvarsan, Remedy for Specific Disease, and Notes Upward Trend of Newspapers

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—The seven greatest world achievements of 1911, according to Thomas A. Edison, were:

Discovery by Ehrlich of salvarsan for the cure of a specific infectious disease.

Attempt to establish a Chinese republic.

Unexpected rapidity of the construction of the Panama canal.

Improvement in aerial navigation.

Important discoveries in surgical technique at the Rockefeller institute.

Final proof of the efficiency of typhoid vaccination.

At the head of the list Edison places the discovery of salvarsan. This, he declared, was a specific for a disease with which nine-tenths of humanity is unknowingly afflicted.

Commenting upon improvements in general, Edison remarked on what he termed a decided upward trend in newspaper building and the effect of prolific distribution of newspapers among the people.

"Newspapers and monarchies are arch enemies," the inventor declared. "Watch a dinner pail crowd in a train or ferry devour their evening news. That's the answer. Nothing will ever happen to this republic of ours as long as this is the case."

## FEAR GREAT COAL STRIKE SO BARONS STORE FEUL

Great Coal Operators Apprehend That 150,000 Workers May Lay Down Their Picks, so Begin Campaign of Publicity

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—In fear of, or in preparation for another great strike of 150,000 miners of coal in the anthracite region, the coal barons, through familiar channels, have started a campaign of publicity.

A statement is being sent broadcast over Pennsylvania that the operators are prepared for a strike in the spring, indicating that they will resist any effort by the United Mine Workers of America to gain any changed conditions for the miners.

A well known press agent employed by the operators is giving publicity here to the statement that the mining companies are now storing coal for emergency use, having between 7,000,000 and 8,000,000 tons on hand at present. There is talk that the unions will demand an increase of 20 per cent in wages this month. They may also ask for an eight hour day, abolition of the board of conciliation and payment for coal mined by weight instead of by the car.

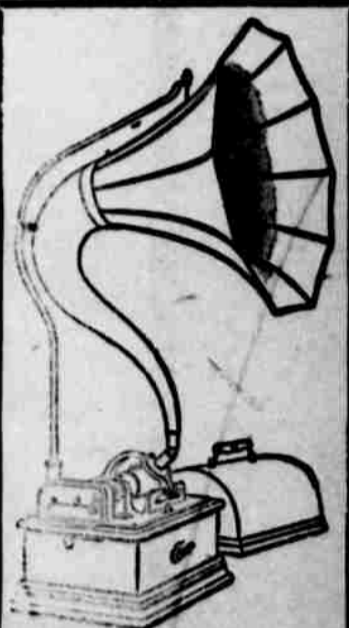
