REVOLUTION IN BALKANS FOR MACEDONIA'S FREEDOM

Possible Situation Being Worse Than at Any Time Since Turkish Constitution Became Effective—Many Fatalities From Bombs

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 10.—With the Bulgarian and Macedonian revolutionary committee determined to obtain the autonomy of Macedonia, a general revolt in the Balkans is expected. The Bulgarian and Macedonian revolutionary committee has established an entente with the Albanian revolutionary committee, and the Balkan situation is worse by far than at any time since the Turkish constitution was ushered in.
Recent bomb outrages have cost much in human life, but they have also called the attention to the desperate conditions of the Macedonian peasantry.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—John McNamara, the accused New Westminster bank robber, who will fight extradition, was arraigned today and got a continuance until Thursday. He denies he is an Australian.
McNamara says he has been engaged in an honest business twelve years. He was unable to furnish the \$12,000 bonds required, and went to the Tombs.

"SEE AMERICA FIRST" STIRS FEAR IN BOURBON BREASTS

Grave Alarm in Europe Through the Movement in This Country, Especially in France, Which Feels Sad Results to Its Commerce

PARIS, Jan. 10.—The "See America First" movement in the United States is causing grave alarm throughout Europe, and Paris in particular is worried over the probable loss of rich Americans' money.
The French newspapers have started commenting on the probabilities of a reaction, declaring it would prove a grave thing for French commerce.

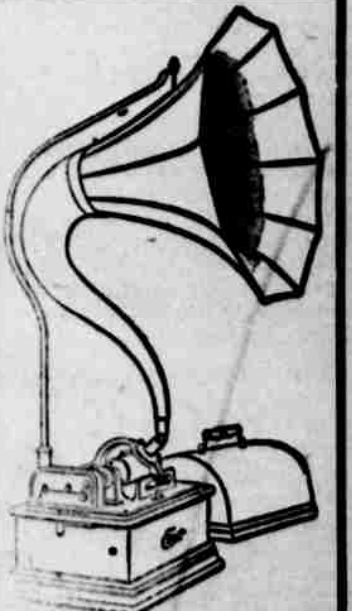
