## SOCIAL DEMOCRATS MAY GET GERMAN REICHSTAG

Government and Conservative Organ  
Concede It Larger Representation,  
Party Itself Giving Most Conserva-  
tive Estimates

United Press Service

BERLIN, Jan. 11.—A substantial  
victory for the social democrats is  
generally conceded and expected in  
the coming elections of a new German  
Reichstag, which takes place Friday.  
It is estimated by even the govern-  
ment and conservative organs that the  
social democrats will have a much  
larger representation in the next  
Reichstag. There is considerable dif-  
ference of opinion as to just how great  
the gains will be. The figures vary  
from 130 to 150 members, and, strange  
to say, the socialists themselves are  
the most conservative in their esti-  
mate. The solution to this being that  
most of the newspapers of the oppo-  
sition are clamoring for the socialists  
for the sole purpose of whip-  
ping up their respective parties to  
greater efforts by slandering the danger  
of such a large socialist representa-  
tion in the Reichstag.

The socialists had 12 in the last  
Reichstag, and have elected seven  
members since. Conservative esti-  
mates are that they will elect a rep-  
resentation of 80 to 90 members.

## SHAW STAYS POLICE HEAD DESPITE MAYOR'S MANDATE

Chief at Oregon City Declares He Will  
Remain on the Job Until Council  
Approves Appointment of Some One  
to Succeed Him

OREGON CITY, Jan. 11.—Despite  
the order of removal issued Saturday  
night by Mayor Demick, H. L. Shaw  
continues to act as chief of police.  
Charles E. Burns, the mayor's ap-  
pointee, contrary to expectations, has  
not assumed the duties of the office.  
The night police force is the same as  
it was under the former administration,  
although the mayor appointed  
one new man, W. W. Bradley, and in-  
structed Shaw to go to work at night.  
The mayor having dismissed Shaw for  
good, it is thought he will name an-  
other night man later. Henry Cooke  
and E. H. Green, not reappointed by  
Mayor Demick, are still working.

"I intend to remain chief until the  
council approves the appointment of  
my successor," said Shaw. "I think  
under the charter I hold on until the  
council acts."

Unless the mayor and council can  
reach an agreement shortly it is be-  
lieved the whole matter will be taken  
to the courts.

## FOUR FOUND DEAD IN BED IN BOARDING HOUSE ROOM

Woman Whose Husband Had Left  
Her—Found, With Three Others,  
Life Extinct, Evidently From Coal  
Gas or Poisoned Milk

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11.—Four  
persons whose bodies were fully  
clothed, were found dead in the board-  
ing house of Mrs. Bridget Flanagan in  
circumstances which the police term  
a mystery. The dead are:

Mrs. Bridget Flanagan, Annie Flana-  
gan, Joseph Flanagan and Kath-  
arine Murray, a boarder. The authori-  
ties seek to determine whether the  
deaths were due to coal gas or to  
poisoned milk, of which all partook.  
Mrs. Flanagan's husband, it is said,  
deserted her about ten days ago.

## CHINESE GLORY RESULTS FROM CHOICE OF DR. SUN

Thousands of Celestials Who Repel  
at Election of That Individual to  
Presidency of Republic Make San  
Francisco Lively

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—Dr.  
Sun Yat Sen's election to the presi-  
dency of the new China was celebra-  
ted here by thousands of celestials on  
the American plan. Old customs and  
oriental costumes were relegated to  
the rear. The affair was more like a  
typical American Fourth of July cele-  
bration than an oriental fete.

In the big parade paper lanterns,  
grotesque signs, tinsel and paper drag-  
ons, enormous silk, tom-toms and  
wired chanting were conspicuous by  
their absence. A banquet was held.

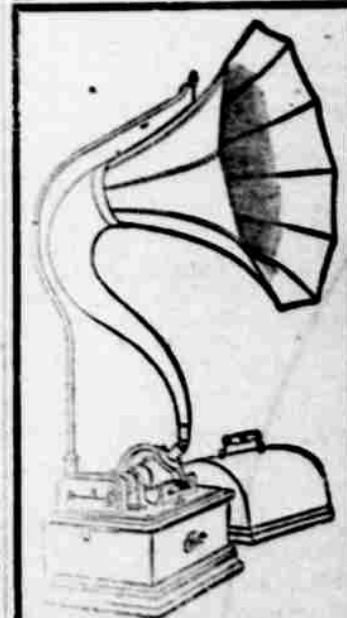
