RAILROAD DAY MILESTONE IN BIG LAKEVIEW EPOCH

County Seat Enjoys Culmination of
Dream That Has Been Handed
Down From Father to Son—Weather
Prevents Outdoor Sports

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 11.—"Railroad day" marked the end of one of the hardest fights that any community in Oregon has made to get into touch with the outside world. It is the culmination of a dream that has been handed down from father to son. The weather has been colder than usual, and the outdoor sports were set aside for the Central Oregon Development League meeting in June.

With the dawn of Saturday morning the people were awake to the necessity of handling the many hundreds of visitors who were coming from points along the Nevada-California-Oregon railway, which was running special trains for their accommodation. The doors of nearly every home in town were opened to strangers. The ladies of the Civic Improvement Club and the Lakeview Commercial Club worked hand in hand in this matter, and saw that everyone had a place to sleep.

When the whistle sounded at Eagle Point, two miles south of town a great cheer rose. When the crowds finally met, the panting engine drawn up at the station site, they were led by the Lakeview band, a splendid organization, to the court house, where all awaited the arrival of the second section of the train. Its passengers were escorted to the same place, where all were addressed by Mayor E. E. Rinehart and President E. L. Britton of the Commercial Club, who turned over the keys of the town to the visitors. Manager T. F. Dunaway of the N.-C.-O. railway, responded in a few words to the welcome extended. The visitors were then escorted to the opera house, where a bountiful spread

had been provided by the ladies of the Civic Club.

The visitors were amazed at the large expanse of territory that the new railroad opens up, and expressed the belief that a few years hence the people would not recognize the valley from any of the old landmarks now in evidence. When told that this was the fourth largest valley in the county and that the others were fully as good from an agricultural standpoint, they marveled. Business men from the south stated that they would return in June and assist in welcoming the delegation from Portland and other Oregon points that will attend the meeting of the Central Oregon Development League.
