AFTER MONEY TO IMPROVE SECOND

COMMITTEE WHICH HAS IN CHARGE RAISING OF FUNDS FOR BOULEVARD ON STREET BEGINS WORK

The committee which has in charge the collecting and disbursing of money for the improvement of Second street, began actual work today in securing subscriptions. The committee consists of G. W. White, Alax Martin Sr., Fred Melhase and John W. Siemens.

The object of the movement is to secure private subscriptions to the amount of about \$10,000 to be used in the improvement of Second street from Klamath avenue to Lake Ewauna, and to lay out and construct a boulevard along the water front of the lake to the city limits.

A great many beautiful residences have been erected on the hill in the

past few years, but the value of this property would be greatly enhanced in value of the magnificent view down the lake and valley was not obstructed by a mass of trees, as at present.

BANKER WILD'S TRIAL IS TO START NEXT WEEK

Former Portland Financier, Whose Court History Has Included Sensational Incidents, May Have Difficulty Picking Jury

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—Louis J. Wilde, San Diego banker, formerly a Portland, charged with the embezzlement of \$90,000 in connection with the wrecking of the Oregon Sailing and Trust bank here, will face the Friday morning. Wilde will be represented by four attorneys.

District Attorney Cameron will be aided by three deputies and Special Prosecutor A. E. Clark. Selection of a jury is expected to be exceedingly difficult, as both sides will seek jurors who have not read much of the news of the recent sensational events which preceded the actual trial.
