LABOR IN CONGRESS NOW STRONGER THAN IN PAST

Fifteen Representatives Who Carry Union Cards Now in Lower Branch of National Legislature, and Have Done Much, Says Gompers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—Trades unionism is more adequately represented in the Sixty-second congress than in the history of the Union movement. According to a list just made public by the American Federation of Labor here, there are fifteen representatives in the house who carry union cards, and who meet frequently to discuss legislation affecting the workmen. No attempt is made to formulate measures at these conferences, and there is no "lobby" formed—the members merely meeting for discussion of matters of interest to union labor. The meetings are also held on the specific understanding that the participants are not pledged to the support of various measures.

MACHINE MADE CARTRIDGES TO REFORM BIG INDUSTRIES

Captain in Austrian Artillery Invents device for Turning Out Man-Killers at Rate of 15,000 per hour—Austria Buys Apparatus

VIENNA, Jan. 13.—Manufacture of cartridges is likely to be revolutionized by a device invented by Captain von Henriquez, an Austrian artillery officer. Ten of the machines have already been ordered by the Austrian government.

Cartridge case, powder and bullet are poured into three funnels of an automatic machine, which measures the powder, loads the case, adds the bullet, controls the length of the cartridge and finally rejects faulty products and piles up the perfect result. Three men work the machine, which makes 15,000 cartridges an hour.
