MAKE CONSUMPTION RARE SOON AT PRESENT RATE

Statement of Dr. Calvin E. White,
Secretary of State Board of Health,
Who Says Very Little Time or Money
Is Spent on Health Lessons

CORVALLIS, Jan. 16.—That death by tuberculosis has been cut in half in the past twenty-five years and that the next twenty-five would see the disease become as rare as yellow fever, as a result of the dissemination of a proper knowledge of the prevention and cure, was the statement of Dr. Calvin E. White, secretary of the Oregon Agricultural college.

"If there is any single word in the English language which has been overworked to such an extent that it has become most tiresome, it is 'conservation'; yet there has not been nearly enough use of the word in connection with health," said Dr. White. He spoke of the fact that very little time or money has been spent in educating the public as to matters of health.

"One-fifth of all the insane, one-third of all the feeble minded, and one-fourth of all the epileptic in the state of Oregon are the result of immorality," he continued. "The conditions existing now are entirely different from those of twenty-five or thirty years ago. Just as the increase in rapidly moving vehicles, such as electric cars and automobiles, have increased the danger to life and limb, just so other changes have increased greatly the peril to health of mind and body. The damnable problem plays that make a travesty of virtue and a mockery of marriage have supplanted the educational evening entertainments of a generation ago. For disease we have our remedies, but for this situation there is no remedy except through education."

After a strong talk advocating vaccination, and telling that the various vaccines and antitoxins have done and of the wiping out of yellow fever from civilized countries by the destruction of certain kind of mosquito, he said: "These things we can do in protecting health, but education is the only thing that will combat immorality. Nearly all vice is the result of ignorance. The time has come when we must cast aside the double standard of morality for men and women. We must tell the boys and girls the results that will follow upon lives of immorality. We have spent vast sums of money in educating their minds, but not enough. That is splendid work, and I would like to see even more spent, but not enough has been spent in education of the body as to the laws of health. The laws that protect life and the necessity for sex purity should be taught to the boys and girls before they come to maturity. We have come to the time when we must speak plainly to them."

"Looking toward such education we called a meeting of 200 men at the Portland Y. M. C. A. It was attended by 500, and from those we named an executive committee of twenty-four to take up the work. We have talked to one fifty or sixty men of the National Guard, and to audiences of men in various professions and organizations, and in each case have been asked to come again. It is the duty of every minister to acquaint himself with the laws of life, so that he can be in a position to give the right information and advice when necessary."

BARE BACKS RUN BLOOD AT PUBLIC WHIPPING POST

Merciless Lashing With Cat-o'-Nine
Tails Given Two Prisoners in Cold
Jail Yard, Witnessed by Crowd of
Morbid Humans

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 16.—

With arms tied to the extended arms of a cross and with backs bared to the zero gale, two men were mercilessly lashed in the court house yard of the county workhouse, part payment of the toll the state exacts for their crime.

John Bremington received forty lashes with a cat-o'-nine tails, in addition to which he will serve two years in state prison for highway robbery. Arthur Johnson received twenty lashes and will serve one year for larceny.

The men suffered frightfully from the cold, and from the blood letting lashes, and staggered, semi-conscious back to their cells.

The whippings, as are all Delaware whippings, were public, and a morbid crowd stood against the prison walls and saw the heavy leather strap with its nine thongs, cut deep into the quivering flesh of the wretches.

NEW BURNS COURTHOUSE CAUSES A SPECIAL TAX

Levy of Three Mills Made by Harney
County Court, Elected Last Time,
and Proposed Structure Will Mean
Outlay of \$50,000.

BURNS, Ore., Jan. 16.—The county court decided at the last meeting to levy a special tax of three mills to build a court house to cost \$50,000. Burns has been looking forward to the time when a county court would be favorable to building a court house and last election they got their men.

A railroad will be built through Harney Valley this year, and the main line will run Burns about twenty-five miles. This city had to do something to keep the county seat from being moved to the railroad. No railroad survey has ever been made to Burns, as the town is located in the northwest corner of the valley, and there is no pass for a railroad.

There is only one town in the county at the present time that is interested in the county seat, and that is Narrows, on Malheur Lake, thirty miles south of Burns. Narrows is on the Hill line survey.

BIG MILITARY MEET FOR KLAMATH

(Continued from Page 1)

In the past few years in the Pacific coast states, but none will have equalled the proposed maneuvers, either in size or importance. The maneuvers of this state have always been held at Alascadero, while those in the north have been held at American Lake, Wash. It is said that the grounds where both these army operations have been held each year, and which were leased by the war department from private persons, have been given up.

The state troops which will be ordered from California will be the Fifth Infantry, Second Cavalry, Seventh Infantry, Batteries A and B, field artillery, and Companies A and B, signal corps. It is expected that the first provisional regiment of coast artillery of this state, under command of Colonel George Schaefer, consisting of twelve companies, will be ordered into the field at the same time.

The land contemplated for military concentration as outlined in the dispatch foregoing is believed to be the seven townships of which Lieutenant Franklin W. Whitley of the department of the Northwest, United States army, stationed at Portland, made a survey and topographical map. Last June and July the officer went over the ground, and a few weeks after his visit a report was circulated that Brigadier General Marion P. Maus, commanding the department of the Northwest, had recommended that territory in the Warm Springs reservation near Pendleton, be secured for military use.

Captain O. C. Applegate, who had been instrumental in getting the national military department to give consideration to the Klamath territory, said at the time that he thought the report was premature for two reasons. One of these was that, in his judgment, Lieutenant Whitley had not had time enough since leaving the Klamath ground to work out his topographical map, and the other that General Maus would hardly make public a recommendation which it would be more in the line of military etiquette to transmit to his superiors at Washington for their discretion as to its promulgation.

The seven townships which are believed to have met favor in the eyes of the army chiefs are partly in the Klamath reservation and partly to the north of it, about fifty miles northward from this city, on the proposed line of the Southern Pacific's Naton-Klamath Falls extension. The land is convenient to the Cascade forest reserve, the Crater Lake National park and the Klamath Indian reservation. It is believed that the headquarters as contemplated by the army will be on the line of the railroad.

Captain Applegate said this afternoon that he felt assured that the report indicated that the maneuvers for the coming summer would be scheduled for the location indicated, although he did not interpret the dispatches as indicating that the Klamath territory had been already decided on for permanent use. He expressed the opinion, however, that after the army had used the area once it would adopt it for regular occupation.

About eight years ago, while Captain Applegate was agent on the Klamath Indian reservation, he made a report to the war department officials calling attention to the advantages of the land for military operations of an educational nature. At that time, however, there was no railroad in prospect.

Over a year ago, in the fall of 1909, Brigadier General Maus, Colonel Jas. Jackson, inspector general of the Oregon National guard; Adjutant General W. E. Finzer, of the state guard

and Captain Dent, an engineer officer of the United States army, department of the Northwest, stationed at Portland, came here and visited the proposed military ground, in company with Captain Applegate and a number of prominent citizens of Klamath Falls and vicinity. They made a preliminary examination of the field.

Captain Applegate also took the matter up with General MacArthur, in command of the army department, with headquarters at San Francisco, but General MacArthur was called in the spring to participate in the army work in Texas, and could not come here.

One of the advantages that the Oregon site offers the army is that it has the flat fields as well as the more rugged country on which the army would practice its movements. It is centrally located, not far from the coast, and accessible from a generally large area.

With a large number of soldiers stationed here during the coming summer the agricultural producers of the country round will have a fine market for everything they can offer. The advantage to be reaped indirectly through this source alone would be of enormous benefit to Klamath Falls.

WAR COSTS MILLION IN MONEY, LEAVING OUT MEN

Turkey's Conflict With Italy Has Already Taken \$20,000,000 From the Ottoman Empire, an Average of \$5,000,000 Per Month

ROME, Jan. 16.—Italy has already spent \$20,000,000 to carry on her war against Turkey, an average of \$5,000,000 a month. Of this sum about two-thirds is provided out of the budget surplus of the last two financial years. The remainder and the future cost are to be met by means of treasury bonds. It is said that some \$10,000,000 can be realized by this means, without resorting to extra taxation.

The Popolo Romano, a semi-official organ, has gathered expressions of opinion from scores of prominent politicians on the advisability of renewing the Triple Alliance. On the whole they favor continuing the present arrangement with Germany and Austria. The general public is opposed to the alliance, but it is not likely that it will be consulted.
