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CANADA MECCA OF ITSELF LEAVING ISLES TO FARM

Bunch of British Peasants to Take Up
Agriculture in Dominion, While
Annual Inspection Excursion of
Land Owners Will Take Place

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Canada is now waiting an "emigration de luxe," which is to take place this year. Several members of the British peasantry are going to take up farming land in Canada in the spring, and a large number of peers will make their annual tour of inspection of their Canadian estates. The explanation of the titled exodus to Canada is due, in part, to modern legislation, and in part to the fact that Canada affords freedom and natural life unobtainable in England, it is said.

Inquiry resulted in a long list of what are known as "gilt edged settlers" and "emigrants de luxe" being discovered.

There are enough titled persons living in Canada or interested in the country to open a house of peers of their own, said a leading railway official. "And with the Duke of Connaught as governor general we have all the material to go ahead and start a colonial kingdom."

"The Duke and Duchess of Sutherland will take up their residence for the coming autumn in their bungalow at Brooks, Alberta. It is a cozy little weatherboard house in the middle of the prairie holdings."

"Earl Grey keeps a hunting lodge in the Columbia Valley, B. C., and Lord Aberdeen owns one of the finest and most profitable fruit farms on the Pacific slope, the Coldstream estate."

"Lord Clanwilliam is a large land holder, and with the Hon. Edward Cole, is interested in the Saskatchewan Investment and Trust company, which owns the leading hotel at Saskatchewan. Both spend much time in Canada."

"Lord Hindlip is the landlord of a vast area of prairie and British Columbia land, and Lord Desbrough is interested in the timber and lumber trade."

"Lord Sholto Douglas is, or was until recently, fruit farming in British Columbia, and the Earl of Stanhope frequently visits the Dominion."

Among other members of the British peasantry who are interested in Canada, either for the hunting or its commercial opportunities, are Lord Strathcona, Lord Lovat, Lord Bruce, Lord Mostyn, Lord Vivian, Marquis of Graham, Lord Wenlock, Earl of Maclefield, Lord Clinton, Earl of Dunmore, Earl of Harrowby and Viscount Gort.

"Among the new settlers is Lord Somers, who recently left the Life Guards to go farming near Toronto, and he is coming home to take out Lord and Lady Hyde, sister and brother-in-law, who are to join him there. Lord Leconfield's brother, Mr. Reginald Wyndham, is another settler."

ALLEGED MAKER OF WILLS TO STAND THIRD TRIAL

Pendleton Woman, Interested in Estate of Wealthy Wheat Grower,
Two Trials of Whom Resulted in Disagreements, Faces Another.

PENDLETON, Jan. 17.—For the third time Mabel Warner, alleged maker of many fraudulent wills, on January 29th will face a jury on a charge of forgery. Circuit Judge Phelps having set that date following the indictment returned against her several months ago by the local grand jury. Twice has she gone through the ordeal which was to decide whether or not she should go to the penitentiary and twice she came free by reason of a jury disagreement. Although once, it is said, eleven of the jurors stood for conviction.

Mrs. Warner is alleged to have made five separate wills, to which she is charged with forging signatures in an effort to gain possession of the estate of James Young, her uncle and stepfather. One of these wills was upheld by Judge Henry J. Bean, now supreme judge and former circuit judge of this district. Upon an appeal the supreme court reversed the decision of Judge Bean and Mrs. Warner was ousted from the farm, whose profits she had been enjoying for several years.

Another will is alleged to have been drawn up, but it was never filed for probate because of the publicity given it after the fact of its existence had leaked out. Shortly afterwards the grand jury met and returned an indictment against Mrs. Warner for forgery, the basis of the charge being the will which the supreme court declared to be fraudulent.

Then came the story of the attack made upon Mrs. Warner by a midnight assailant, which story many believe to be true, but which others declare to have been but an attempt of the shrewd woman to excite sympathy for herself before her third trial. At that time Mrs. Warner gave out an account of how a man had knocked at her door at night while her husband was absent, choked her into insensibility, and after ransacking the house for papers bearing on the case, left her unconscious on the floor where she lay for several hours.

Still later Mrs. Warner gave out a story of a second attempt made by her enemies to invade her house. This time she declares her husband was awakened by the odor of chloroform, and suspecting that some was attempting to put the inmates of the house under its influence, grasped his revolver and opened the door in time to see a fleeing man.

Mrs. Warner professes to have no fear of the outcome of the coming trial, for she declares she has evidence enough not only to establish her own innocence, but to put the leaders in the long fight against her in the penitentiary. She will be tried by an outside judge because of the connection Judge Phelps had with her two previous trials while he was district attorney.

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MANY GLASSY BIRDS ENTER POULTRY SHOW FOR PRIZE

Gathering of Swell Fowls Scheduled
for Pacific Coast Association's Big
Barnyard Meet at Seattle During
Next Month

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—That the poultry show to be given here by the Pacific Coast Poultry Association the week of February 6-10 will mean to this coast what the Madison Square Garden show means to the Atlantic seaboard already is an assured fact. Although the entries do not close until February 1st, more than 600 classy birds have been entered, and it looks as though Bert Lucas, secretary, will have to use great discrimination to hold the list down to 1,500, the number decided upon by the officers of the organization.

Ninety per cent of the entry fees will go into a cash prize fund, and in addition to this 50 per cent of the net proceeds from the show will be given in special cash prizes, half of which goes to first cock, cockerel, hen and pullet. The balance will be divided among all prize winners.

The association is receiving the backing of the largest commercial houses in Seattle, and more than eighteen cups have already been donated. Principal among these is the Golden Potlatch cup, valued at \$150. The Commercial Club of Walla Walla has donated a \$50 cup.

All prize winning birds will be photographed free of charge, photographs to be presented to owners to identify birds at future shows.

An important factor is that absolutely new coops will be used, eliminating all possibility of valuable birds contracting disease from previously used coops.

E. L. Prescott is president of the new organization, Bert Lucas is secretary, and A. D. Cowan is treasurer. All are well known in poultry circles throughout the Pacific coast.

The show will include California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia, Canada, but entries from any part of North America are invited.
