LAKE COUNTY TAXES GET BOOSTED BY STATE LEEY

Newly Assessed Rate is Nearly Two Mills Higher Than Last Year in District Which Has Always Boasted Lowest Taxes on Coast

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 18.—The annual tax levy for the coming year has been made by the county court and is 1 1/2 mills—one valuation of \$8,166,000.

The rate is 1 1/2 mills higher than that of last year, but is due to the high proportion of state taxes. Lake county has always had the name of having the lowest taxes of any county on the coast.

MUTUAL AID SOCIETIES FOR LABOR, IDEA OF HAY

Washington's Governor Suggests That Both Hired and Hired Contribute to Them for Means of "First Aid" in Accident Cases

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 17.—The establishment of mutual associations to which both employers and employees are to contribute, to provide "first aid" in accident cases, was recommended by Governor Hay to the State Federation of Labor, as a means of assisting the operation of the industrial insurance law.

Governor Hay urged the workers to plan a new "first aid" amendment for the industrial insurance law, to take the place of the one stricken by the last legislature.

The governor's address was devoted entirely to the new compensation law. "A desperate fight is being made against the law by the casualty companies," he declared. "With them it is a death struggle. As to the ambulance chasing lawyers—they, too, realize that with the establishment of industrial insurance their occupation is gone."
