THE CITY'S FINANCES

THE fact that the city's financial
 condition is not in good shape
 seems to be the occasion for some peo-
 ple to boast the mayor and advertise
 to the world that Klamath Falls is a
 ruined city and on the verge of bank-
 ruptcy from which it is insurmountable
 cannot recover. No one who is sincere
 in his efforts for the good of
 Klamath Falls would allow his personal
 animosity for an individual
 jeopardize the future development of
 his home town. Rather than attack
 the individual, those who wish to see
 Klamath Falls grow, as it has every
 reason under the sun to do, should
 offer some solution to the present
 financial problem, and then use every
 effort at their command in influence
 the adoption and carrying out of this
 program. It is only the vicious that
 will attack a public policy without of-
 fering a remedy.

It is true that Klamath Falls, at the
 present time, is not on a sound finan-
 cial basis. It is also true that Klamath
 Falls, for the past twenty years,
 has not been managed in a business-
 like manner.

This is a condition that is familiar
 in every small community in the
 United States. When a city reaches
 a point, as has Klamath Falls, when
 it is plain to the ordinary thinking in-
 dividual, that the community has
 passed the stage of the village, and
 must make preparation for its even-
 tual growth to an important business
 center, then it is that the entire sys-
 tem of management in use in the past
 must change, and a business and
 financial policy adopted that will lay
 the foundation for the erection of a
 big city.

This time has arrived for Klamath
 Falls, and while many faults may be
 found with the city charter, it is
 folly to attack its validity, inasmuch
 as it was actually adopted by the vot-
 ers with every opportunity given them
 of knowing what it contained. It is
 not likely that the people will repudi-
 ate their own acts, and, besides, what
 particularly bad feature does the pre-
 sent charter contain? Does it contain
 any laws that would injure or harm
 the citizen and property owners? If
 so, we have never heard them men-
 tioned. The only fault we have heard
 is that the city has outgrown it. Good
 for the city. That is the best
 evidence possible that Klamath Falls
 is growing and is news that any of
 the citizens should be gratified to
 learn, even if it necessitated changing
 the charter every six months.

The city is in debt, but why
 shouldn't it be, when we have been
 making improvements the past year
 which will be a benefit to owners of
 the property twenty or thirty years
 from now, when many of the present
 citizens are dead and probably walk-
 ing the golden streets instead of
 bitulthie or concrete? Improvements
 must be made if Klamath Falls con-
 tinues to go ahead, but the time has
 arrived when this city should be
 placed on a financial basis and policies
 adopted which will give the city a
 dollar's worth for every dollar it
 spends. The city is not getting its
 money's worth, and it is wasting the
 money paid in taxes by the citizens
 simply because the proper financial
 policy has not been adopted and fol-
 lowed.

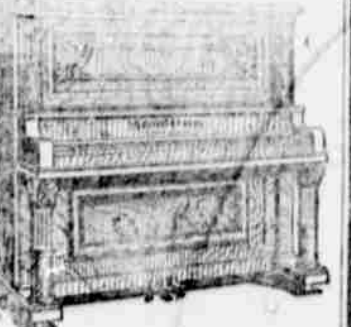
