STEPHENSON EXONERATED BY ELECTION COMMITTEE

AWAIT PROJECT OPENING IN LONG, PATIENT LINE

Applicants Have Stood Since Morning After Christmas, Believing That Tieton Third Unit Will Be Partitioned Before April 1st

NORTH YAKIMA, Jan. 19.—Forty-four men and women waiting in line before the door of the United States Land office are greatly perturbed by a dispatch from Washington to the effect that the department of the interior is seeking to devise some means by which everyone wishing to apply for lands under the third unit of the Tieton project will have an equal chance.

The applicants have been in position since the morning of December 26th. They believe they have inside information from Washington that the lands will be opened soon. Land office officials here say they know nothing more than the old ruling that the third unit will be opened before April 1, 1912.

The campers have organized to make their conditions as comfortable as possible in view of the probability that they might be compelled to remain for some time in order to hold their supposed advantage.

Some of them are business men, and these have arranged a plan of exchange by which those with business demanding their attention spend only a couple of hours a day "on duty." The rest of the time their places are held by other members of the party. In the same manner the places of the women members have been held by the men at night.
