WIFE'S SONGS GIVE HEART TO EXHAUSTED CAPTAIN

And Crew, Who Fight to Save Vessel and Themselves When Heavy South Easter off Kureha Strikes Lumber Schooner C. A. Thayer

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—After a ten days' battle with the sea, during which time Mrs. Carroll Scott, wife of the captain, sang to her husband while he was lashed to the wheel of the lumber schooner C. A. Thayer, out of Grays Harbor, is in port, waterlogged almost to the deck line, and with her crew weak and famished.

Two days out the schooner got a leak, which steam pumps and all hands could not keep down. Two days later the crippled schooner struck a heavy southeaster off the coast, ninety miles north of Kureha. Men worked until they dropped exhausted and revived only to work again.

Mrs. Scott slaved with the crew, feeding them bread and coffee and singing to them while they toiled. The storm tore away half of the rigging and everything portable went by the boards. Captain Scott had to be lashed to the wheel, and his wife encouraging him, kept him awake until the steamer president sent a tug to take the heroine off. She refused to desert her husband, who would not leave his ship.

The President had all she could do to brave the storm herself, so could not tow the disabled schooner. After a fearful night the steamer J. B. Stetson came along, sent over a crew and towed the Thayer into this port. The vessel is owned by the E. K. Wood Lumber company.

NEGRO BRUISER GOING TO NEW YORK SEEKING FIGHT

Changes Mind About Visiting Metropolitan and Says Is Determined to Show That Boxing Commissioner Cannot Discriminate Against Him

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—After declaring war on the metropolis, pugilistically, Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion, has changed his mind and declares he intends to leave for New York soon to sign for a match there with either Carl Morris or Al Palmer. The fact that Chairman O'Neil of the New York boxing commission has stated that Johnson would not be permitted to engage in any bouts in New York state.

When reminded today that he had said that he would "blacklist" any fighter engaging in a contest in New York, Johnson said:

"Well, Ah reckon I've got as much right to change mah mind as anybody else. I just want to show Mistah O'Neil that he can't discriminate against mah."

Johnson received a \$15,000 offer to engage in a ten round contest from a New York club. The name of his prospective opponent was not named, but it is believed to be either Morris or Palmer. Johnson said he would ask more money from the bidder when he arrives in New York.

SOUTHERN REPUBLICANS SCRAP OVER FAVORITES

Three Branches of Party, Representing Trio of Leading "Mentions," Want to Capture Delegate to National Convention in Windy Burg.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—A bitter pre-convention fight is being waged throughout the South by three branches of republicanism, according to reports. Organized campaigns to capture delegates to the Chicago convention are being conducted by the Taft forces, the La Follette boomers and more recently proponents of Colonel Roosevelt.

Politicians here were surprised when they heard that foremost among the Roosevelt workers below the Mason and Dixon line was Ormsby McHarg, originally a "Roosevelt boomer" in 1907, later one of Hitchcock's lieutenants, lining up Taft delegates in the Western country, substantially rewarded for his work by a job as assistant secretary of commerce and labor, retired. It was reported, because he issued an interview characterizing Roosevelt as "the little yellow dog under the republican hand-wagon."

Reports that McHarg had experienced a change of heart about Roosevelt were received with much interest, as much as the other tip—that George W. Perkins, former partner of J. P. Morgan, and at present director in both the steel and harvester trusts, is financing the Roosevelt boom because of his personal friendship for the colonel.

Representative Nelson (progressive republican, Wisconsin) is in charge of the nurturing of the La Follette boom in the South. Secretary Hillie is busy lining up the administration forces for Taft.

in parking and grading his goods. For example, it is estimated that the farmer loses 17 per cent of the value of his eggs on account of faulty methods of marketing. The dealer should instruct him how to remedy this.

"I do not favor the public market; neither do I sympathize in the clamor for the elimination of the middleman. Production and distribution are two different fields of endeavor. There should be a better recognition of the mutual interests between all classes of citizens. 'Live and let live' should be the motto of every business man. Encourage the patronage of home institutions and cut out the mail order concerns of distant states, which neither pay taxes in Oregon nor have the slightest interest in our welfare other than selfish commercialism.

Property owners in our cities and towns should be content with a less rental and thus cease to drain the very life blood of the country, for these exorbitant rentals must all be met from the products of the soil. Merchants should study the various problems of distribution more closely, and endeavor, if possible, to introduce more economical methods. It is not by any means in the interest of economy to have a half dozen delivery conveyances belonging to as many different concerns delivering the same class of goods in a city block at the same time. Such a system is a great waste of energy and means. This waste, however, has to be made good by the consumer and producer. There must be a more general spirit of getting together and adjusting these faulty methods of distribution.

"Finally it is presumable that many homes would be benefited if a more simple mode of life were followed. It is rather too fashionable for the family with an income of \$500 or \$1,000 dollars to presume to live at the same standard of the family with an income of \$2,000 or \$3,000. This, of course, means inevitable disaster in the end. A careful analysis of the problem will show conclusively that the increased cost of living is not due to the initial cost of food. It will also show that the farmer is receiving a lower rate of interest upon his investment than those engaged in any other industry. In fact, if the plant food taken from the soil by many of the crops were estimated at its commercial value, these crops would be produced at an actual loss."

who were somewhat allied to the brute kingdom in its various divisions, some being wolfish, some foxy, some leonine, some porcine, and some even like the malodorous and unwholesome mephitic mephitic or spilogale potioris, commonly called the skunk.

Attorney John Irwin's topic was "Our Young Men," he stating that the young man made his own measure by his own efforts. There was a tendency among a good many young men to measure themselves by standards which were not always those of fidelity.

George J. Walton spoke of the intention of the church to form a men's Bible class, which was the occasion of the banquet, in order to draw men together. "The Church Deserving Better Support" was his topic, and he said that financial support was not all the church needed, as it was requisite that association and effort be imparted to the church by the individual as well as his money. He said that the best man among men, even those not particularly partial to the church, would admit was not turned out by the forces inimical to the church. Mr. Walton referred to the fact that many people are prone to take everything for granted, the sunshine, the air, good fellowship and the church privileges. He argued that a man was a debtor for all these things, and should appreciate them in a positive way.

William D. Ludkins, state secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and former lawyer, from Portland, was present. He was a classmate at Morningside M. E. college, Sioux City, Iowa, with Attorney W. H. Shaw, who sat almost opposite him at table. Being invited to speak, Mr. Ludkins said that he did not agree with anyone who contended that the church forces were not forging ahead, for he said, the movement for better men was more energetic than it had ever been, and there was a mighty sweep forward at the present time, a greater movement than the world had ever known. He spoke in favor of the work of the Methodist Brotherhood, in which he is interested.

O. E. Rucker, who is to teach the men's Bible class at the M. E. church, was called on. He said that the best business man was the good Bible scholar, and that knowledge of the Bible made men better fitted to deal with their fellowmen.

Judge Benson, who had presided during the evening in his happiest mood after the available speakers had been heard, asked Rev. Fesse if there was anything else, and the dominie said there was not. The judge suggested a rising vote of thanks to the women, which was given by a quick and unanimous rise. There being nothing further before the house, the judge suggested that the men had better get out and give the women a chance to clear off the tables, and they did so.
