GRASP THE OPPORTUNITY

KLAMATH FALLS has a good
 prospect for securing a federal
 building. If the people of this city
 do not lose interest and expect our
 representatives in congress to do it all.
 While a bill has been introduced ask-
 ing for an appropriation, we cannot
 expect our representatives to put up
 much of a fight if we, ourselves, show
 a lack of enthusiasm in the matter.
 We should let our senators and con-
 gressmen know that we mean busi-
 ness, and intend to get that federal
 building if we have to go to Wash-
 ington for it. We should do our share
 toward securing favorable action by
 congress by meeting them part way
 and offering free of cost a site on
 which to erect a federal building. It
 would show that we did not want
 something for nothing, and would be
 a great help to our representatives in
 securing recognition of our claim.

We have two commercial organiza-
 tions in the city, and surely both of
 these should be interested in securing
 a government building for Klamath
 Falls. If these business men would go
 to the county court and secure a de-
 finite assurance of a site on the court
 house block, to be forwarded to those
 working for us in Washington, we be-
 lieve that before the year ends we
 would see work commenced on the
 erection of a \$100,000 federal build-
 ing right in the heart of the business
 section of the city. Does this appeal
 to you, Mr. Businessman and Prop-
 erty Owner? If so, get busy.

BUDAPEST EATS LESS BEEF
BECAUSE OF HIGH PRICE

Cost, Attributed to Protective Policy,
 Is Such That Better Paid Artisans
 Can Afford It Not More Than Once
 Weekly

 BUDAPEST, Jan. 20.—Twenty per
 cent less beef and veal were consumed
 in Budapest in 1911 than in 1910.
 This decrease is attributed to the
 excessive prices resulting from pro-
 tection. Even the better paid artisans
 in Hungary cannot afford meat more
 than once a week. The poorest live
 almost entirely on vegetables.
