TEDDY AND ONE MORE TERM

IT BEGINS to look rather strongly
 as though Theodore Roosevelt
 would be in the running for the re-
 publican nomination for the presiden-
 cy. In fact, to the mind of many peo-
 ple, it appears that if there are any
 circumstances under which he can be
 induced to run he will be so heartily
 favored by the delegates in convention
 assembled that no other body will
 have a show.

Taft, La Follette and Cummins are
 now avowed candidates while Roose-
 velt has been so often approached to
 get his attitude as a possibly avail-
 able man that he has become tired of
 saying anything on the subject. Sev-
 eral years ago he said he positively
 would not be a candidate for a third
 term. He had the unfinished term of
 the late President William McKinley,
 and a full term by the electorate. In
 the technical sense of full terms he
 has, to be sure, had but one. In an-
 other sense, even if he were to be
 nominated this summer at Chicago,
 he would not be running for a third
 term, this being with reference to a
 continuous tenure of office.

But leaving technicalities aside,
 there is little doubt that he will run
 if, as one of his political friends has
 said, he was "drafted." Even if it
 were a proposition for a third contin-
 uous, full term of four years, the peo-
 ple's will would prove stronger than
 even that of the colonel, if they were
 determined to have him.

IS WIFE'S GIFT TO COP

Chicago Policeman Who Is Accredited
 With Making More Arrests Than
 Any Other One in Past Year, Has
 Son With Rare Distinguishing Equipment

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—A baby boy
 weighing 15 pounds 2 ounces, and
 having four fully developed teeth, was
 born here to Mrs. Martin Mulvehill,
 whose husband is a police sergeant.
 The baby is healthy, and brings a new
 hero medal to his father, who a few
 days ago was credited with having
 made more arrests than any other
 Chicago policeman during the year
 just past.

"I have known of cases where the
 baby was born with one tooth," said
 the attending physician "but never
 before have I seen four teeth."

CLUB WOMEN GETS THIEF
SHE FINDS IN HER HOME

Grapples Coattails of Burglar Who
 Manages to Slip From Earnest
 Grasp and Takes Refuge in Barn,
 Where Police Nab Him

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 22.—Grap-
 pling with a burglar and leading in
 the chase which finally resulted in his
 arrest, Mrs. Sidney T. Palmer, a
 prominent club woman, had an excit-
 ing experience.

Returning home after a brief ab-
 sence, she found evidences of the visit
 of a burglar, and started to telephone
 to the police when she met the intru-
 der descending the stairs. Seizing his
 coattails with one hand, she tried to
 close the front door with the other,
 but the burglar squeezed through and
 ran, with Mrs. Palmer in pursuit.
 A flock away a crowd of schoolboys
 joined in the chase, and the thief was
 forced to take refuge in a barn.

Mrs. Palmer summoned the police
 while the boys kept guard, and the
 officers found the burglar's feet stick-
 ing out of a barrel into which he had
 dived head-foremost in his mad flight,
 and was unable to extricate himself.
 About \$400 worth of jewelry which
 he had thrown away while running
 was recovered. The prisoner gave his
 name as Charles Kaufman, and ad-
 mitted the crime.
