Hammering
While the newspapers are knocking and kicking at the city administration, perhaps it is a good time for others to get in a few words.

First, I want to remind the editors that they are not helping the matter by publishing the statement--and a false statement at that--that the city is perhaps bankrupt. How much better it would be to suggest a remedy, for there is certainly no ground for alarm, while property values are increasing and have so bright prospects for further increase in the near future.

The paving bonds will be taken care of by the property owners, and this debt is in a class by itself, that the city need not worry about. But the main problem seems to be to get the municipal expenses down to a minimum, and get the city's business on a paying basis, so that the money is not going out faster than it comes in.

The city has been for the last year engaged in the saloon business, and if this is not showing a balance of dollars and cents in favor of city economy, let us quit it. If the license money does not keep the jails and courts in good running order it is due time to call a halt, for the city is not running this business just for the honor of it.

We may think the saloon keeper is paying handsomely for his privilege of manufacturing drunkards, but consider the fact that the city is furnishing all the material and disposing of the manufactured product, we may be greatly deceived and disappointed when making an invoice. The material used is very costly, and the product is not disposed of very readily. A human being is made drunk in a saloon, is kicked out on the street in a crazy condition. If not immediately taken care of by a policeman he is going to commit some offense and here is a true statement made by the deceased chief, Townsend, that an extra policeman should be furnished for every new saloon. The unfortunate victim is generally without money, so the city must pay for his arrest and keep in the jail. The city is also responsible for what crime he may commit while in this condition, and if the judge or district attorney are out on vacation or indisposed to take up the case, which happens quite frequently, the fellow is kept in jail sometimes for months at the city's expense. A poor business, indeed!

The municipality will, like the individual, in a short time go broke. And still the only proposed remedy is more saloons and more whiskey.

A change of administration is the cry on every hand, but what is the standard of qualification looked for. A man with clean blood and a clear brain, with integrity, honor and ability can not be elected. He must be a supporter of the saloon and a judge of good whiskey or else this city cannot trust him to look after its affairs. Where are we drifting?

The blunders made in the paving contract and the city charter, are they not enough evidence that the city dads sometimes take one too many?
