ROYAL COUPLE AT MALTA
ENJOY CORDIAL RECEPTION

Picturesque Harbor Gaily Beflagged,
 Warships Fire Salute and Regal
 Fair Are Allowed to Drive Along
 Street Close to the Hot Pools

MALTA, Jan. 24.—King George
 and Queen Mary, homeward bound
 from India, arrived here today on the
 royal ship Medina. As compensation
 for not having visited Malta on the
 way to the Durbar, they stopped off
 to permit their subjects here to see
 their sovereigns.

The picturesque harbor of La Val-
 letta, the most easterly bulwark of
 Christendom in the Mediterranean,
 was gaily beflagged when the royal
 liner and her cruiser escort dropped
 anchor. Warships under command of
 Admiral Sir Edmund S. Poe fired a
 salute as the royal party landed.

General Sir Leslie Rundle, governor
 of Malta; General Sir Ian S. Hamil-
 ton, commander in chief of the Medi-
 terranean; Chief Justice Sir J. Car-
 bone, members of the legislative coun-
 cil and a crowd of Maltese nobles re-
 ceived the royal party with a state
 welcome. Troops lined the streets.

The king and queen held a recep-
 tion for officials and noblemen at the
 government house.

For the first time since they left
 British soil the king and queen were
 permitted to drive along the streets
 with the crowds as near as ten feet.
 They seemed to enjoy the experience.
 The reception was genuinely cordial.

NOT APPROVED BY CLERK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—
 Andrew Carnegie and the house of
 representatives are at odds because
 Chief Clerk South refuses to pay Car-
 negie the \$28.70 witness fees and
 railroad expenses he declared due him
 from the exchequer for testifying be-
 nevolent.

JUDGE FLAYS MURDERER
IN PRONOUNCING SENTENCE

Declares Nothing Offered in Mitiga-
 tion of Offense, and Imposes Sen-
 tence Than Which None Greater
 Could Be Given Young Man

OREGON, Ill., Jan. 24.—Dr. Har-
 ry E. Webster of Chicago was sen-
 tenced to life imprisonment by Judge
 Richard S. Farrand for the murder of
 Bessie Kent Webster last October.

In pronouncing the sentence the
 court reviewed the crime, and de-
 clared that "no greater known punish-
 ment could be inflicted on a young,
 intelligent man, than to imprison him
 for life." Judge Farrand said:

"Harry E. Webster, on the 12th
 day of this month, the anniversary of
 your bigamous marriage with Bessie
 Kent, you entered a plea of guilty to
 the charge of murder. It then became
 the duty of the court to hear and con-
 sider such testimony as might be of-
 fered in mitigation of aggravation of
 the crime committed. None was of-
 fered that would in the least mitiga-
 the offense. Your attorneys have
 spoken their last words in your be-
 half, and it only remains for the court
 to impose your sentence.

"During the progress of your hear-
 ing two mothers have sat before us.
 The heart of one was bleeding as
 memory recalled the suffering and
 death of her daughter. The heart of
 the other was wrung in agony because
 of the acts of her living son. Which
 of the two was suffering the greater
 grief only mothers that have been
 down in the dark valley of gloom and
 despair can answer. All this came be-
 cause of your cruel act. Surely it
 causes one to think deeply of the
 tragedy of life and mystery and sor-
 row of death.

"The crime to which you plead guilty
 was a cruel and cowardly one. Un-
 der the name of husband you beguiled
 Bessie Kent to a lonely spot, where
 in childhood days, you had passed
 hours of pleasure, and there, in the
 quietude, you took her life. The
 brain that conceived and the hand
 that inflicted that mortal wound was
 trained and skilled in the use of the
 knife."

"With one blow the weapon pene-
 trated a vital part, and almost in an
 instant her life went out, and I be-
 lieve that while the warm blood was
 still flowing from the gaping wound,
 you denuded her person and allowed
 her body to lie on the ground, and
 the fall rains to beat on it during the
 long days and lonely nights for two
 weeks, until, by accident, the body
 was discovered in a desolate ravine—
 her bed of death, which you selected
 for her.

"In your bill of divorce which was
 dismissed as a fraud and an imposi-
 tion on the court, you sought to black-
 en the character of the dead. Aside
 from the language in the bill so filed
 there is not a scintilla of evidence in
 the record justifying the conclusion
 that Bessie Kent was other than a
 sweet, pure girl up to the time you
 put your debauching hands on her.

"It is the sentence of this court
 that you be imprisoned in the peni-
 tentiary at Joliet for and during your
 natural life, the first day of that im-
 prisonment to be in solitary confine-
 ment, the balance of the time at hard
 labor, and that you pay the costs of
 prosecution."
