VESPUCCI'S WORKS BRING HIGH PRICES AT AUCTION

Chicago Outfits New York at Sale of Works of Deceased Italian Discoverer and Gets Some Very Rare Specimens

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Chicago outfit New York for Amerigo Vespucci's works at the Hoe auction sale when Walter M. Hill of that city gave \$17,500 for four items.

The Kalbfleisch copy of the first edition of the complete account of the four voyages, believed to have been printed in Lisbon in 1508, brought \$8,000. Bernard Quaritch, who sold the book to Hoe for \$3,250, it is said, bid \$7,000 to day. But four other copies are known to exist.

The present series of auctions of the Hoe books ended tonight with a total of \$471,671.8 realized during the last two weeks for the 3,621 items offered. The grand total, including last fall's sale, is \$1,468,982. There are still about 6,000 books and manuscripts to be sold.

SUGAR FACTORY GIVES UP, RAW MATERIAL LACKING

Enterprise in Oregon Town Quits the Fight, Reason Assigned Being Lack of Labor to Grow Beets Needed for Use in Making

LA GRANDE, Jan. 24.—The La Grande sugar factory is to be dismantled. After several years of unsuccessful effort the Amalgamated Sugar company has given up the fight. The lack of labor to grow beets is the real cause of the change of plans.

The Amalgamated Sugar company has a good offer at Burley, Idaho, where 5,000 acres of beets are pledged for five years. There is a large area to draw from in the Twin Falls country, and much of it is well irrigated. To get a new factory much of the machinery would have to be manufactured, and there is but little time to spare, for the factory must go in this year to comply with contracts.

FLAP OF SKIRT SAVES GIRL WALKING, LOST IN DESERT

Men on Train in Midst of Dry Mojave Plain, See Garments Move; Stop the Train, and Rescue Weaker, Who Is Unable to Speak

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—A girl's skirt, flapping in the wind, stopped a train in the midst of the Mojave desert, and brought about the rescue of Adella Kretschmer, an 18-year-old San Francisco girl, according to advices received here.

Miss Kretschmer had started on a walk in the desert near Hepler, Cal., and lost her way. When trainmen reached her her swollen tongue protruded through parched lips and she could not speak. She was taken to a hospital at San Bernardino and resuscitated.

MANACLED, MAN HEARS HIS FATE ANNOUNCED BY COURT

Italian Wife Murderer Listens to His Death Sentence as He Stands Laden With Chains and Deputies by With Guns and Clubs

United Press Service

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—For the first time in the recent criminal history of the metropolis a man was sentenced to death here while manacled and laden with chains as he heard his fate before the bar. Deputies stood over him with clubs drawn and ready guns. It was feared the desperate man Joseph Serrone, would kill somebody in the court room if these precautions were not taken.

Serrone murdered his wife last October by cutting her throat. He was convicted last week, and when the verdict was brought in he tried to murder one of the jurors. Then he gashed his own throat with a piece of glass, and fought until he was clubbed unconscious.

Learning that Judge Foster was about to sentence him he jerked the bandage from his throat and tried to tear the wound open again. Again he had to be beaten into unconsciousness before he was subdued by his guards. Then, recovering, loaded with chains, he was carried bodily into court. Judge Foster learned that blackhanders planted a mine in the court and had threatened to murder the detectives. So he ordered the doors closed.

Serrone will be electrocuted during the week of February 2.

LAWS FOR PEOPLE FAVORED BY UNIONS OF ARIZONA

First Draft of Constitution for State's Federation of Labor Reveals Them as Cardinal Features Which Are Desired

PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 24.—Strong endorsement of the initiative, referendum and recall, the latter particularly in its relation to elective and appointive officers, and the reservation of public lands for entry by settlers only, were the cardinal features of the first draft of the constitution for the Arizona State Federation of Labor, which was adopted here.

Other measures endorsed in the document were: Free text books and free noon lunches for public school children; weekly payments for all labor; abolition of the convict labor system on all public works; an eight hour day; postal savings banks, and collective ownership of producing and distributing agencies.

According to unofficial poll of the delegates to Arizona's first state labor convention, the constitution probably will be adopted finally with very few changes. Certain added features, however, are contemplated.
