HOW ABOUT THIS?

THE EVENING HERALD does not
 own any shares of stock in the
 Klamath Falls Light and Water com-
 pany, and has not been subsidized in
 its favor. It has not been asked by
 any person connected with the water
 company to do anything to favor that
 corporation, and holds no brief for the
 concern.

But the peculiar attitude of the
 city as so far manifested toward the
 company at least calls for inquiry.

The water company has been in-
 formed by a high city authority, ac-
 cording to word that is freely cir-
 culated from the best of sources, that
 the city will accept no water from the
 company that has its origin within
 the city limits, and that under this
 state of mind of the city, it intends to
 install a municipal water supply.

Without any warrant to base any
 claim that no pure is to be found
 within the city limits the assumption
 is adopted that no such thing as de-
 cent water exists anywhere under the
 earth which the city limits confine.

This is a good deal like claiming
 that everybody in Klamath Falls is
 wicked because a few people are. It
 is just as reasonable, just as sane and
 just as fair.

At the same time the city takes it
 upon itself to order the water com-
 pany to put in water plugs at various
 points about town where they are
 needed for fire protection and the
 company complies. It is of course
 impossible for the water company to
 furnish water from any source other
 than the springs on the Reames home-
 stead. It could not consistently hunt

\$20,000 FOR BOTH LEGS, PRICE PAID INJURED BOY

**Southern Pacific Makes Settlement on
 Probably Most Expensive Basis
 Ever Recorded in County of Mult-
 nomah**

PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—Probab-
 ly the largest settlement in a damage
 case for personal injuries ever reach-
 ed in Multnomah county was made
 when the case of Charles Winfield
 Wise against the Southern Pacific
 and the contracting firm of Gleblich
 & Joplin was called for trial. The
 attorneys announced that a settle-
 ment had been reached whereby Wise
 would receive \$20,000. The plaintiff
 is a lad of 18 years. Last May he
 was employed as assistant hostler in
 the Southern Pacific yards, and was
 thrown from a switch engine when it
 ran into a derrick in the track. He
 fell across the tracks and lost both
 legs.

Gleblich & Joplin were joined as
 defendants with the railroad on the
 theory that they were partly respon-
 sible for the accident, having con-
 structed a sewer under the tracks at
 the point where it settled.

It is understood that the railroad
 pays \$10,000 of the total, Gleblich
 & Joplin \$5,000 and the Casualty In-
 surance company, in which the in-
 surators held a policy, the remaining
 \$5,000. Attorneys Wheelock & Wil-
 liams, John F. Logan and I. N. Smith
 represented the lad.

"The boy will receive something
 more than \$14,000 as a net amount
 of damages after the attorney's fees
 and expenses are paid," said Logan.
 "He has already concluded to buy a
 farm for \$10,000 and to complete his
 education with the balance."

George Wise, father of the lad, re-
 ceived a judgment of \$1,525 last
 week against the railroad and con-
 tractors for loss of services of the
 boy, which his parents might claim
 until he is 21.

WORK AGENT DUPES LABOR ALLEGED VICTIMS ASSERT

**Employment Office Accepts Fees
 From Applicants for Positions**

SPokane, Wash., Jan. 25.—Eight
 men coming here from Spokane a
 few days ago, sent down by an em-
 ployment agency at Spokane to work
 at the Northern Pacific shops here,
 made a report to local officials that
 men were sent here after paying for
 jobs, given a few days' work and dis-
 charged to make room for more, and
 it was intimated that the local con-
 tractors were working with the em-
 ployment agency to mislead the men
 out of their fees.

Contractor Smith of the firm hav-
 ing the contract for erecting the new
 roundhouse and car shops, says of the
 matter:

"When these men arrived they
 were all offered work and remained
 in the camp, in fact eating supper
 and breakfast there. Two men had
 been discharged that night, and they
 spread the story among the newcom-
 ers that men were being hired here
 constantly, employed for five days,
 and then discharged to make room
 for additional men. The story is a
 falsehood, made up out of whole
 cloth. Any man seeking employment
 can find a position with us, and we
 have been forced to rely upon the
 employment agencies for additional
 help from time to time."
