DAIRY HUSBANDRY GETS IMPETUS AT CORVALLIS

Fine New Three-Story Brick Just Completed Will Be Used by Students for Learning Handling of Bovines and Their Product

CORVALLIS, Jan. 25.—The handsome three-story building which is to house the department of dairy husbandry at the Oregon Agricultural college is now nearing completion, and when the second semester opens February 12, will be ready for the use of the classes in dairying.

At a cost of \$31,000 the college has built a spacious red brick building, trimmed with gray stone, north of the agronomy building, facing the east on the court of honor. Pillared entrances are at the south and east, and at the north is a porte cochere for the delivery of milk and cream, which from the receiving room will be taken down an incline to the separating room or to the cheese room.

From the room reserved for washing cans and other utensils an elevator runs to the second floor to the laboratories. An automatic rinsing, drier and sterilizer will be put at the end of the sink in the wash room. A boiler and engine room and cheese curing rooms complete the north end.

The separating room contains a new cream ripener holding 200 gallons. Between this room and the churn room is a refrigerator room, and off each room is a smaller refrigerator. Beyond the churn room is a market milk room.

A concrete sterilizer will be installed in a room off the hall, fitted with steam coils to produce a temperature of some 220 degrees. Locker and cloak rooms and lavatory with shower baths and other conveniences are in the south end of the building, near the general office, which will have two smaller private offices for the professors and instructors and a dark room.

On the second floor there is a large class room, and beyond it a storage room for supplies and a shop for repairs, examinations and studies of dairy machinery. Instructions in the use of machinery ordinarily used on the farm, such as hand butter molds and workers, will be given in a room

set aside for this purpose. Next is the milk testing laboratory, which will accommodate 120 students in sections of 40.

A private laboratory for research and experiment has been reserved for the faculty. The reading room will be supplied with all the best dairy periodicals and reference works. At the south end of the hall is an instructor's office and drafting room and general class room.

The lecture room occupies the entire south end of the third floor. The rest of the third floor will be used at present by the mathematics department.

DIVERT ST. LAWRENCE FLOW OBJECT OF BIG SYNDICATE

Bunch of Capitalists With \$10,000,000 (Prospective) Hopes to Get Parliament's Approval and Develop Million Horsepower Near Montreal

MONTREAL, Jan. 25.—A syndicate with a capitalization of \$100,000,000, headed by Sir Max Aitken, who was recently elected to the British parliament, hopes to secure from the government a franchise to divert the St. Lawrence River near Montreal and develop electricity up to 1,000,000 horse power.

The proposal is to switch the whole St. Lawrence River at the Chateau and Cedar rapids, just above Montreal, and to take the waterway nearly half a mile from the present course. The length of the proposed embankment will be between twenty-five and thirty miles, and will involve the building of 5,000,000 feet of earth-work.
