of Klamath Falls vs. Swindler case, why,

Here's the case of Henry Fleck-
stein & Co. vs. P. C. Campbell and
Mike Supon, in which eight horses
were under an attachment for six
months. The horses were seized by
Sheriff William B. Barnes and his
merry men on July 24 last at Port

Supon, set up a complaint in court
against the two defendants, aver-
ring that they had promised him
\$1,000 to secure their acquittal. He
asserts that none of the money has
been paid to him. He had the horses
attached.

The horses were attached as the
property of Campbell, who alleges
that they are the property of his
nephew, Tomas Cannon, now in ed-
ucation.

If these horses are as wise as some
domestic quadrupeds of which his-
tory and fiction tells us, they will
emerge from the harness of the at-
tachments fat and sleek.

P. S.—If you want to live cheaply,

BLAST RIVER, SAVE CRAFT FROM CRUSH OF ICE CAKES

Missouri River Opened to Fleet Boats
Which Are in Danger of Breaking
Loose From Huge Mountain of Ac-
cumulated River Ice

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 25.—Ice
in the Missouri River here has been
blasted. A recent thaw opened a
100-foot channel on the Kansas City
side. Should the huge mass of ice
on the opposite side break loose the
craft moored in the river would be
crushed and a jam near the junction
of the Missouri and Kaw rivers might
cause a repetition of the serious
floods of several years ago.

NUMEROUS FINGER PRINTS YIELD NO CLUE TO CORPE

Police of Missouri Metropolis Look
Carefully Over 7,000 Records to
Learn Identity of Headless Body
From Black Hand District

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 25.—Comparisons
with 7,000 finger print records on file
in the police department were made
here in an effort to fix the identity of
the headless body of a man found in
an ash pit in the "black hand" dis-
trict.

men who had proclaimed themselves
enemies of the "black hand." No
trace of the head has been found.

desires of annexing and placing in
its exchequer.

Attorney E. L. Elliott, for the
liquor firm, had the attachment
placed in operation, and afterward
tried to get the sheriff to sell them
under section 204 of Lord's Oregon
laws. The sheriff did not care about
selling them, for some reason, so the
eight palfrays for a time remained at
Port Klamath until they were
brought nearer the scene of the legal
conflict and placed on the ranch of
Crimmer & Miller.

Since July 24th six months have
lapsed, and those six months have
been cinches for these nags. They
have taken life just as it approached,
without endeavoring to furnish any
industrial trimmings. Just who will
pay for their play time does not ap-
pear yet, but it is believed that it
will mean a nice little bill, for the
circuit court recently figured that a
horse's keep these troublesome times is
worth about \$15 per month. Six
months and eight horses and the
\$15—just mix the three up a little
and you get a sum total of \$720. This
is a higher bill than is involved in the
Swindler case, for while in that action
the horses stayed out of action more
than six months, there were fewer
of 'em. The bill there was about
\$600.

In the circuit court yesterday the
Fleckstein case was thrown out of
court on a non-suit because it was
not established to the satisfaction of
all parties that the plaintiff was a
corporation as averred in its com-
plaint. Attorney E. L. Elliott tried
to get the court to take the position
that the defendants had dealt with
the Fleckstein concern as a corpo-
ration, and was, therefore, estopped
from raising a point against that state
of being, but Judge Henry L. Benson
did not feel inclined to take this po-
sition. If the suit is not tried again
the liquor folks have to pay the horse
bill. If tried again and they win,
maybe they will not pay it.

But the horses, by the way, are still
under attachment. Owing to the
court considering that the animals
were automatically released by the
disposition of the issue, without a
formal order of court, Deputy Sheriff
Marion Barnes let them go, whinny-
ing and moping, but it was not for
long.
