

LOST FOOT BILL DENIED BY SECRETARY OF STATE

Oleott Sees No Way of Settling for
Federal Extremity Lost by Man Who
Went to Sleep on Railway Track
and Was Awakened by Accident

SALEM, Jan. 26.—Secretary of State Oleott says that he will disallow the claim on the state made by Cyril Boothby, who was injured on an Oregon Portage railway train recently.

Boothby asked that the state pay him \$468 to cover the expenses of having his foot amputated, and his hospital fees.

Secretary Oleott can find no appropriation to cover such expenses, but will file the claim and refer it to the next legislature.

In the statement filed by Boothby he states that he went to sleep on the railroad track under a car, and woke to find his foot being crushed by the wheels.

PHYSICIAN DIES OF DRUG AND BODY FOUND IN BARN

Was Addicted to Use of Chloroform,
Against Which He Had Been Warned
by Friends, But He Insisted He
Understood Conditions

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 26.—With his hat drawn down over his face and a handkerchief saturated with chloroform near, Dr. J. D. Scanlon, for ten years a practicing physician of this city, but lately of Portland, was found dead in the loft of his barn at Twenty-sixth and East B streets, this city, by his hostler, Jan. Anthony. Three bottles of the drug, two partly empty, were found near the body.

Those who knew Dr. Scanlon best say that he was addicted to the use of chloroform, and had been warned against using it. He assured friends that he fully understood the drug, and no harm would come to him from it. After taking long drives, it is said, his nerves would be in such condition that chloroform was used to produce sleep.

\$30,000 DAMAGES ASKED FOR CHARACTERS HURT

Family of Girl Impersonated on Sus-
picion of Murdering Her Sister De-
cides to Go After City of Spokane
for Considerable Funds

SPOKANE, Jan. 26.—In addition to a claim for \$10,000 damages already filed against the city by Elizabeth Weber, George and Anna M. Weber, the girl's parents, will demand \$20,000 for damage to their character. The claims are made as a result of Elizabeth Weber's imprisonment in connection with the murder of Anna Weber, her sister, a few weeks ago.

Senator George W. Shafer is representing the Weber family. The damage charged by the murdered girl's parents is based on the ground that the authorities falsely charged them with improperly caring for and mistreating Elizabeth Weber at the time she was taken in custody.

The girl was suspected by the police of having knowledge concerning her sister's murderer, was confined day and night while the investigation was being made, was threatened and frightened by the officers in an attempt to draw admissions from her.
