STUDENTS SETTLE TARIFF QUESTION

they cannot compete with the factories abroad. As to free trade fostering political corruption, every time the tariff is likely to be subjected to attack the protected capitalists drive to Washington and spend thousands of dollars in lobbying, log-rolling and bribery. Why should a man pay \$1.75 for \$1 worth of sugar, or \$1.50 for \$1 worth of shoes?

The third speaker to take the protective side was Mr. Cox. "We admit that protection is a natural stimulus to production," said he, "and we are proud of it. They seem to think if the worst thing they can say of protection makes high wages, but that it maintains them."

To the contention that low tariffs

were never followed by panics he answered by quotations from a book that seemed to indicate that most low tariffs had opened the door to business depression. He said that of foreign countries the examples of the effects of protection as against free trade was well illustrated by Victoria, which adopted tariff, and New South Wales, which had free trade. The former grew and prospered notably, while New South Wales did not compare in advancement. The fact that England has free trade is not a criterion, he maintained, for England has it while her imperial colonies are protected, and have become her markets. How can we compete with foreigners on their own ground without competition? Our home market is fourteen times as great as our foreign markets. When reciprocity was offered to Canada she, considering the experience of other countries, voted it down. If free trade comes, manufacturers will cut wages low, and if labor refuses to accept, the industries will move to foreign countries, where they can get the cheap labor, or to protected countries to get the tariff shield. Drive manufacturers out and the country would be helpless in time of war, for only a country with her own means of making armament has any chance in national warfare.

Mr. Fiel here took up a little more time for protection, saying that it costs twice as much to produce woolens, and two-thirds more to make cotton goods in this country than abroad. It would be bad policy to bring into play anything that would cause a business disturbance either at once or in fifty years, which was an argument against free trade even gradually introduced. The opposition, he asserted, had failed to show any disadvantage that would be removed by free trade.

Mr. Mowatt concluded for the Jackson county team, saying that under free trade in the country there had been but one panic, and under protection thirteen the last being as recently as 1907. He claimed that England pays the biggest wages and has the highest standard of living of any European country, and is under free trade. Protection diverts labor and wealth into a few hands, corrupts politics and causes a surplus of industry where the maximum production has already been reached. Protection does not increase wages and makes a

man give full work, with the necessity of paying for twice what he gets. In announcing the result of the debate Rev. Stubblefield held three slips in his hand which contained the votes of the three judges. The first favored Ashland. The preacher's hesitation about giving the third vote caused some of the boys in the audience to yell, "Come on with it," and finally, after testing the youthful patience to the breaking point he turned to the Klamath debaters, and told them they had the third vote.

Maybe some enthusiasm did not follow!

It seemed to be the belief among the hearers last night that the Ashland men were the better speakers by a degree or so, but it must be considered that they are all seniors. The local debaters are sophomores, and Miss Short, a senior. There is no question but what the visitors had talent which is of no slight order of delivery. But the Klamath youth had the facts. In the opinion of the judges, and possibly were somewhat embarrassed at times by the number of home folks they were facing.

Mr. Mowatt, before the evening program was concluded, spoke to the Ashland team the appreciation the members felt for the kindly treatment they had been given in this being taken into the homes of residents and given the best of welcome by the local student body. He promised for Ashland to return the compliment if the local people ever had occasion to visit there. He contending teams shook hands around before leaving the stage.

The spirit of the visitors was shown in every way to be manly and dignified. They gave no evidence of great disappointment at the adverse and appeared to be almost as glad the Klamath victory as if it had been their own. In bearing and in delivery they convinced everyone who heard them that they were "foemen worth of the steel" of the home lads and others.

Prof. M. D. Coates, who coached the local team, was the recipient of congratulations for his success in making his trio of orators up to the winning stage. He had put much of his pains into his work.

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
