DEAD RESTORED
BY THE LATEST

**MACHINE SIZE OF SUITCASE CON-
TAINS MEANS OF REVIVING
PEOPLE WHO DIE OF GAS OR
ELECTRICITY**

According to an item in the Chicago
Daily Socialist, people can be re-
stored to life by an oxygen machine.
Read the item:

That miracles no longer belong to
the dark ages of mythology and su-
perstition was again demonstrated
Tuesday when L. A. Cummings, 65
years old, was raised from the dead
by two common workmen in overalls
and an oxygen machine belong-
ing to the Commonwealth Edison
company.

The oxygen machine is a recent in-
vention, about the size of a suitcase,
recently imported by the company,
and can be used in restoring life in
cases of electrocution, drowning or
asphyxiation.

In the successful demonstration
Cummings had been overcome by
fumes from a small gas heater which
was used to heat his bedroom. Dur-
ing the night the flame had blown
out and the escaping gas overcame
the sleeping occupant of the room.

The two workmen are loaders at
the plant of the Edison company.
About 10 o'clock a telephone call
announced the discovery of Cum-
mings' lifeless body in his room.

Without further delay the men
loaded the machine into an automob-
ile and hurried to the little flat at
1337 Dearborn avenue. Attaching
the machine to Cummings' nostrils
the two workmen started the arti-
ficial respiration. Slowly the ma-
chine inhaled oxygen and exhaled
the fatal gases from the seemingly
dead man's lungs. Soon the dead
man began to show signs of return-
ing life, and within five minutes the
watchers saw life returning to the
contracted features of the dead.

Cummings is now restored, and
the recovery, which was miraculous,
will go down as one of the many mi-
racles which are performed today by
advanced science.

**A FLOAT AT SEA SINCE 1904
MESSAGE REACHES SENDER**

Portland Man Receives Message
Which He Placed in Bottle and
Dropped Into Atlantic—It Has
Evidently Been "Going Some"

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—Traveling
eight years at sea in a beer bottle,
and probably circulating the At-
lantic Ocean one or more times,
a message reached J. P. LEE, of
Corbett street, at his office in the
building.

1904 Crossley threw a beer
bottle into the sea fifty miles off Fire
Island, just out of New York, in
which he enclosed one of his cards.
On the back of the card he wrote:
"This bottle was thrown into the
sea from the steamer Parthna, off
Fire Island light, June 16, 1904.
Will the finder please return it and
advise where and found?"

At the point where the bottle was
cast overboard is to the northeast, on
the great swing around the Atlantic
Ocean. Mariners declare there is no
current southerly in that vicinity,
and according to all reckonings the
beer bottle with its card message
started across the northern end of
the Atlantic.

The incident had nearly been for-
gotten by Mr. Crossley until a letter
written by Robert Magwood of Mt.
Pleasant, South Carolina, and dated
January 14, 1912, was received,
with the following announcement:
"The attached card was found by
the writer Friday, January 5, 1912,
at Cape Roman, off the coast of
South Carolina, on a little island be-
hind the cape. The bottle had prob-
ably been washed over the cape by
the gale of August 27."

This letter was addressed to 711
Arch street, Philadelphia, the ad-
dress on the card. From there it was
forwarded to 44 Westview street, Mt.
Airy, Philadelphia, and thence sent
to the Portland address of Mr. Cross-
ley, who has been in this state five
years.

A letter of thanks has been sent
the finder of the bottle, and the fact
reported to the societies keeping rec-
ords of movements of objects afloat
upon the Atlantic.
