Three Men Taken Into Custody
Accused of Rustling, Butchering and
Peddling Bovines, whose Loss Had
Been Ascribed to Timber Wolves

MEDFORD, Feb. 1.—John McKee,
Andrew and Wilbur Coffman were
taken into custody for cattle stealing.
It is charged they have been engaged
in rustling cattle on Little Butte
Creek, a few miles north of this city,
for two years, butchering the beef and
peddling it.
John McKee, a boy of 19, broke
down when arrested, and confessed,
according to the authorities.
Cattlemen blamed their losses on
timber wolves until recently. The
authorities claim that in the past two
years the gang has stolen 150 head of
cattle.

TAFT'S RENOMINATION IS CINCHED, HILL THINKS

President's Secretary Maintains That
Situation Has Cleared Wonderfully
in Past Week, and Republicans
Everywhere Are Rallying to Chief

and republicans everywhere are falling
into line for the president."

of Free Workers, and Further Development
of Steel Corporation's System of Efficiency.

system, as used by the United States
steel corporation. These are the main

taken up.
