CAPITAL NECESSARY

FARMING is, as a rule, conducted
 with too little capital. A goodly
 proportion of farmers are renters.
 Another portion are paying for farms,
 and a very small number are men who
 are actually going backward in the
 business. We have a banking system
 which is responsive to supplying cap-
 ital at a low rate of interest to manu-
 facturing, transportation and other
 lines of business. But our banks are
 not so responsive as they should be
 to supplying money to the farmers,
 especially to the beginner and the
 renter. This is particularly true in
 the South, though the painful situa-
 tion following the civil war is being
 considerably changed, and has im-
 proved much during the past several
 years.

Dr. S. A. Knapp and his 500 help-
 ers have done much to inaugurate a
 change in financing the annual mar-
 keting of crops as well as working
 out better methods of plowing, plant-
 ing and cultivating. Some modified
 form of the European form of "rai-
 feisen," or farmers' credit banks, is
 needed in all parts of the country, and
 especially in the South and West.

The plan started by Dr. Knapp of
 having a farm efficiency man em-
 ployed at public expense for each
 county is beginning to spread through-
 out the North as well as through the
 South. These men as advisers of
 credit society committees can assist
 many farmers who are now making
 very small yields to enter upon their
 business with a new farm plan, farm
 machinery, improved seeds and a new
 inspiration that will enable them to
 make large profits on modest loans.

GOOD ROADS PROCLAMATION

GOVERNOR OSWALD WEST has
 issued a proclamation setting
 this week apart as "Good Roads
 Week," and it is well worth reading.
 It follows:

Oregon is on the eve of a great
 awakening. The morrow will bring
 the Panama canal, and with it will
 come unbounded opportunities with
 their attendant influx of population
 and consequent commercial and in-
 dustrial growth, advancement and
 prosperity.

Our Creator in the beginning
 moulded our state with kindly hands.
 When we think of her delightful cli-
 mate, her hundreds of miles of golden
 beach, her lofty mountains and rush-
 ing streams, crystal lakes and beau-
 tiful harbors, her magnificent forests
 and rolling prairies, fertile valleys
 and roaming herds, of her waving
 grain and luscious fruits—a land dot-
 ted with prosperous cities and produc-
 tive farms—we must admit that na-
 ture has fully performed her part. The
 federal government, too, has treated
 us fairly in the way of appropriations
 for the development of our waterways
 and even the railroads have awakened
 to the realization of our needs and
 their opportunities, and are checker-
 boarding the state with bands of steel.

In view of these things we are
 prompted to ask ourselves what
 should we do in the way of co-opera-
 tion with these several agencies for
 the development of the state? It is
 true that we have given good laws,
 good government and good schools,
 and many other desirable things to
 those who have come within our bor-
 ders, but much of this good has been
 nullified by some of the things we have
 failed to do, and chief among these is
 our neglect in the matter of the con-
 struction of good roads.

Without good roads there can be
 no great development and no great
 progress. What we need is more peo-
 ple—more people in the rural dis-
 tricts. And in order to attract people
 to the rural districts we must make
 rural life pleasant and attractive. You
 cannot maroon a new settler and his
 family on a farm in an ocean of mud,
 no matter how beautiful the spot, and
 expect to find him happy and content.
 He demands good roads leading to the
 church and the schools, and good
 roads leading to the markets, and he
 is going to locate in that section
 where these advantages are to be found.

It is not only our duty, but it is in
 keeping with good business to build
 good roads. Money spent for good
 roads is money well spent. When we
 speak of spending several millions of
 dollars during the next few years in

road construction many are staggered
 by the proposal and the figures. They
 apparently are not aware that the sev-
 eral counties in this state spent over
 ten millions of dollars during the past
 six years for road work, much of
 which was lost through lack of system
 and knowledge as to scientific road
 building.

The question of good roads has
 been fairly well discussed of late, and
 we have learned more about road-
 building during the past few years
 than we ever knew before, but we still
 have much to learn, and still have
 much to do before we undertake on a
 large scale the construction of a sys-
 tem of highways in this state.

We need: First—The passage of
 model good road laws. Second—A
 competent man at the head of the
 highways department. Third—Funds
 sufficient to carry on the work.

These things will come only through
 united effort, and united effort will
 come only through a clear under-
 standing of the whole question by the
 whole people of this state. This un-
 derstanding will come only through
 the study by, and education of, the
 whole people.

Numerous bills are about to be in-
 troduced or presented to the legisla-
 ture by the friends of good roads in
 different parts of the state; and

Whereas, It is most important that
 the people of Oregon should give deep
 and thoughtful attention to the con-
 sideration, study and discussion of
 these measures.

Now, therefore, I, Oswald West, gov-
 ernor of the state of Oregon, by vir-
 tue of the power and authority in me
 vested, do hereby proclaim the week
 beginning the fourth day of February,
 and ending the tenth day of February,
 as Good Roads Week, and I do hereby
 earnestly recommend to the people of
 this state that during this period the
 question of good roads legislation be
 given careful thought and study
 through public and private discussion
 and through the columns of the press,
 in order that knowledge pertaining
 thereto may be increased, public sen-
 timent crystallized and effective leg-
 islation secured.
