

"SQUAW MAN" BIG DRAMATIC ITEM

He aimed the same (it was not a fowling piece) in the direction of the trespasser. The report startled the chicken thief, as well as the neighborhood, not to mention the contents of the sack. The man, agitated at the shooting, made his escape without the chickens. All it cost Williams was a little sleep and a few shot. City Marshal Samuel L. Walker contributed some shoe leather to the incident, for he hustled to the scene to ascertain the cause of the shooting. If he knows who made the attempt to gather in the chickens he will not tell.

GRAND JURY WILL REPORT IN DYNAMITING MATTERS

Federal Inquisitorial Body at Indianapolis Has Copies and Copies of Indictments Prepared for Use in Prosecution

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 6.—The grand jury reports this afternoon. Copies and certified copies of the indictments have been prepared.

Later—the grand jury reported thirty-two indictments in the dynamiting cases.

Over forty men are reported to be implicated, owing to the grouping of individuals in some of the indictments.

Conspiracy to violate federal laws by transporting explosives is one of the charges. Names of those involved are suppressed.

JAPAN TO HAVE TWO WARS IS THE FORECAST OF STARR

Professor in University of Chicago Predicts That Oriental Nation Will Have Conflict With Russia and China Within Two Years

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 6.—Japan is to have war with both Russia and China within the next two years, predicts Professor Frederick Starr of the University of Chicago, who discussed the situation in the Far East, from whence he has just returned, in a letter to the Society of Natural Sciences here.

He forecasts that both wars will be fought in Korea, which is the bone of contention, he says.

RYING TO FURNISH SKIN FOR INJURED AVIATOR

He Was Accidentally Shot by Fellow Flyer, Who Is Anxious to Give Material for Grafting Operation Instead of Sufferer's Wife

LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 6.—The wife of Aviator Frank Champion is vying with John Gibson, a mechanic, who accidentally shot him, over the privilege of sacrificing several inches of skin to be grafted on the wounded man's leg. Gibson shot Champion as they were leaving Dominguez field January 5th, a shotgun which he carried being accidentally discharged.

HELPER SAVES HIS BOSS AT RISK OF HIS OWN LIFE

Boilermaker Overcome by Foul Gases in Firebox He Entered to Clean, and Is Saved by Loyalty of Italian Assistant

RENO, Nev., Feb. 6.—Sacrificing his own life to save his boss, Luigi Framaschini, a boilermaker's helper, rescued E. L. Briskell, boilermaker, from death in the poisoned fumes of a locomotive firebox at Sparks.

Briskell entered the firebox to clean it and was overcome by the foul gases. Framaschini went to his assistance, pulled him out, but was himself overcome. Italian laborers found both men unconscious. Briskell soon revived.
