DEFIES ANTI-HOME RULERS,
OPENS BATTLE IN FAVOR

Winston Churchill Takes Up Cudge-
for Irish Autonomy, Despite Fact
That His Father Lost Cabinet Job
for Opposing It

BELFAST, Feb. 8.—Defying the
belligerent anti-home rulers of Ulster,
Winston Churchill, first lord of the
admiralty, opened the government's
campaign here today in behalf of
home rule for Ireland. In addition to
the fact that parliament convenes next
week to take up this subject, especial
interest attached to his appearance
because of his father's (Lord Ran-
dolph Churchill) strenuous opposition
to home rule, on account of which he
had to relinquish his position in the
Gladstone cabinet. Lord Randolph
was author of the phrase "Ulster will
fight," which is being used as the
present day war-cry of the Orange-
men.

So high is the state of feeling in
Belfast that the most rigorous police
precautions were taken to prevent in-
terruption of the meeting—or even
more serious consequences.

Churchill appealed to the loyalty as
well as the self interest of the Irish
people to support the government's
policy. Declaring that the present
parliamentary system of Great Brit-
ain is not sufficiently representative of
the local and provincial life of the
nation, he commented on the fact that
England's two greatest rivals, the
United States and Germany, are ad-
ministered respectively by 46 and
23 separate legislative bodies.

In order to keep pace with the
world movement he considered it vi-
tally necessary for England to learn
how to combine the fullest expression
of national and local aspirations and
activities with the strongest frame-
work of imperial unity. He regarded
home rule for Ireland as the first
milestone along the road to the event-
ual unity of the English speaking
races.

ULTIMATUM TO WORKERS
IN UNCLE SAM'S ARSENAL

Commander at Rock Island Strong-
hold Tells Laborers That Cards
Must Be Accepted or They Will Be
Discharged, Not to Return

DAVENPORT Iowa, Feb. 8.—Col-
onel Burr, commanding officer of the
Rock Island arsenal, replied to the
ultimatum of the employes that if the
Taylor "job cards" were used they
would strike.

He said the cards will be issued,
and that any men refusing to accept
them will be discharged.

"According to the civil service
rules," said the Colonel, "such dis-
charge will be for cause, and the man
so discharged cannot be employed at
the arsenal again. The places of all
men who quit work will be filled
promptly, and we anticipate no diffi-
culty in securing help."

A movement is being started among
the business men of the Three Cities
to secure a settlement of the trouble.

EARTH, AIR AND WATER ARE
NAVIGABLE IN ONE CRAFT

Aviators Parmelee and Turpin Make
Start on Terra Firma, Soar Into
Ether, Then Skim About on aque-
ous Surface of Pacific.

VENICE, Calif., Feb. 8.—That air,
earth and water navigation is possible
with the same craft is attested by
25,000 persons who saw Aviators Par-
malee and Turpin start from land
soar 2,000 feet into the air, and alight
on the ocean's surface for a dozen
sharp spins.

of the trips, which were made without
accident.
