PRIVILEGE vs. PEOPLE
SOON TO MAKE LAST STAND

Rev. Herbert Bigelow Says if Ohio Surrenders to Progressives, There is Even Hope for Less Hot-tentness in Keystone State

 COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 10.—The struggle about to begin on the floor of the constitutional convention of Ohio will witness the last great stand of "privilege" against the demand of the people for a government of their own. If Ohio surrenders to the progressive idea, the day even of Pennsylvania's deliverance will be near at hand.

Thus does Rev. Herbert S. Bigelow of Cincinnati, president of the constitutional convention of Ohio, sum up his hopes and aims as to what shall be incorporated in Ohio's new organic law.

The convention has been in session since January 9th. Preacher, progressive leader, and sincere advocate of the rights of the masses, Bigelow's friends say he embodies the rare human link between politics and religion.

"My politics," said Bigelow today, "is to apply the spirit of Christianity to human relations. My religion is to believe and help in the upward march of mankind to self government and equality. Tom Johnson of Cleveland showed me what a clean man, with an iron will and true zeal on behalf of the people, can accomplish in the political arena."

For the United Press Bigelow today expressed his ideas of the scope of the constitutional convention as follows:

"Ohio's fourth constitution convention has been convened at a crucial time. The initiative, referendum and recall have come out of the West to try their strength in the first great state east of the Mississippi.

"The conservatives in the convention believe that representative government is threatened. They are ready to throw themselves with zeal into the struggle to save the institutions of the fathers, to halt the heresy of direct government, to turn it back and balk its further victories.

"It looks like a forlorn hope that the conservatives are to follow. But they are ably led. The old order will be defended by able and earnest advocates.

"The friends of the new doctrine of direct and responsible government look forward to the struggle with confidence. Personally, I hope to see the convention complete its work within the next sixty or ninety days. I hope to see it recommend municipal home rule, a state legislature held in control through the initiative and referendum, and a supreme court that can be made to render opinions that are constitutional.

"Of course, there are many ideas more or less ripe for the picking, such as the short ballot, woman suffrage, recall, classification of property for taxation, state construction of high-ways, abolition of capital punishment, license system of the liquor traffic and a preferential ballot without party emblems.

"But responsible government is the one great issue—the right of the people to have a direct voice, not only in the making of the new law, but also in its interpretation."

Bigelow's real name is Herbert Seely. When 9 years old he ran away from home. His wanderings took him to Florida as a bellboy in a hotel, and there he became interested in the Bible. The rare spe spectacle of a bellboy reading the Bible attracted the attention of E. A. Bigelow of Cleveland, who adopted him as a son and gave him an education in two state colleges. The preacher-politician is now 43 years old, and looks much younger.

EIGHT HOURS LEGAL DAY
FOR THOSE ON STATE WORK

Majority of State Board Decide to Construe Law Strictly, According to Request Made to Them by Representatives of State Labor Unions

SALEM, Feb. 10.—Hereafter any contractor entering into a deal with the state will be required to agree before the contract is awarded to not work mechanics over eight hours a day.

During Governor West's recent visit to Portland he was waited upon by representatives of the labor unions and asked to see to it that the law on the subject be strictly enforced.

The law provides that mechanics employed by the state shall not be required to work over eight hours, but unless construed strictly, it is maintained, this would not apply to men employed by one who had a contract with the state.

The labor representatives have asked that the state board place a strict construction on this law, and Governor West has expressed himself as willing. Secretary of State O'cott agrees with the governor, and the two constitute a majority.

CANADA DUTY ON LUMBER
MAY GO UP DECIDEDLY

Dominion's Lumbermen in Tariff Meeting Behind Closed Doors, Decide to Memorialize Government to Make Rough Sawn Stuff Dutiable.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 10.—Changes in the Canadian tariff in the direction of increased restrictions upon imports were advocated by the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, which discussed the tariff behind closed doors at a meeting here.

It was decided to memorialize the government to place all lumber other than rough sawn on the dutiable list.
