BOMBARDMENT OF PEKIN
SEEMS TO BE IMMINENT

Rebel Battleships Enter the Harbor
Where Original Republican Plans
Were for Landing of Troops for
Overland March to Imperial City

TIENTSIN, Feb. 12.—Rebel battle-
ships have entered the harbor of
Shanghai Kwan, east of Peking. It
is believed that a bombardment is
imminent. The republican's original
plans contemplated the landing of
troops at Shanghai Kwan and an over-
land expedition against Peking.

inferentially assailed Wilson personal-
ly and directly attacked Wilson's failure
to recommend repeal of the New
Jersey corporation laws.

HAMLET'S SOLILOQUY OF HIS
"OPEN SESAME" TO WEALTH

Fish Peddler Who Years Ago Recited
It to the Delectation of his Uncle,
Is Notified That Avuncular Rela-
tive Leaves Him \$200,000.

BOSTON, Feb. 12.—Robert Smith,
a fish peddler, when a school boy in
Dublin, Ireland, thirty years ago,
committed "Hamlet's Soliloquy" to
memory and recited it for his uncle,
who was so well pleased that he told
the lad he would remember him in
his will. The uncle died a few days
ago, and advice just received by
Smith indicate he is heir to an estate
valued at \$200,000.
On receipt of the news Smith
dumped his fish cart over the "T"
wharf and announced that he would
leave on the first train for San Fran-
cisco, whence he would take ship to
Australia, where his sister lives. He
will share his legacy with her.

EGGS LAID IN MAELS MAY
CAUSE MUCH COGITATING

Treasury Department Says Hen is Not
a Bird, So That If There's Parcels
Post and Fowls Are Transmitted
Through, What Then?

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—
The treasury department having de-
cided that a hen is not a bird—birds'
eggs being admitted free of duty and
hens' eggs having to pay 5 cents a
dozen—it is now up to the postoffice
department to settle a momentous
question arising from the ownership
of eggs laid in the mails.

The National Association of Poultry
Breeder, anticipating the passage
of the parcel post bill, recently in-
quired of Postmaster General Hiram
Clegg if poultry might be sent through
the mail. In an unofficial statement
the department answered that, should
the parcel post measure be enacted,
there would probably be no objection
to shipping the fowls, stamped. The
postmaster general however, was of
the opinion that some one would have
to be delegated to look out for the
well being of the "perishable mail"
and then some one raised the question
of the ownership of the eggs laid by
the hens while in Uncle Sam's care.

Would they belong to the owner
of the hens; to the receiver of the
hens; or to the government?

There not being any legislation al-
ready enacted upon the subject, the
postmaster general delegated Jesse
Suter, chief of the bureau of infor-
mation of the postoffice department
to look into the matter. Jesse, after
several days spent in a vain search
through dusty tomes on postal laws
and regulations, has about decided to
give up the job, for he says there are
no precedents. Therefore, it will be
up to the courts to decide the ownership
of any offspring of the fowls.

Liko the freight agent in Ellis Pas-
ker Butler's "Pigs in Pigs," Suter
thinks the eggs ought to be given to
the mail clerks or be confiscated by
the government as an aid in further
decreasing the deficit, which is the
burden of the department.

REFUGEES USE HANDCARS
TO GET OUT OF MEXICO

Bicycles, Burros and any Other Means
of Transportation Eagerly Adopted
—"Mexico for Mexicans" Seems to
Be the Slogan Followed

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 12.—An anti-
American sentiment is strong in Chi-
huahua, and hundreds are arriving.
There are no trains, the refugees us-
ing handcarts, bicycles and burros.

Employees of the Peason company
at Casas Grandes are fleeing. Thirty-
five Americans have arrived. They
declare a "Mexico for Mexicans" cam-
paign has been inaugurated at Cori-
titos.

TAFT HUSHED UP SCANDAL,
IS WHIPPLE'S CONTENTION

Says Charge of Conduct Unbecoming
Officer Preferred Against Major
Taft Was Suppressed at Suggestion
of Chief Executive

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—
Brigadier General C. H. Whipple, re-
tiring paymaster general of the army,
told the house committee on expendi-
tures in the war department that
charges of conduct unbecoming a gen-
tleman and officer against Major
Becher B. Ray of the army pay corps
had been suppressed at the sugges-
tion of President Taft.
Ray, it is charged, took an active
part in the Taft campaign of 1908,
and his political activity has been un-
der investigation by the congressional
committee.
